RECIPE
Arizona Squab and Rice

1 squab
1 lb. shrimps
2 cups boiling water
1 onion
Salt, pepper

2 lbs. clams, in shell
1 cup rice
1/2 cup tomato puree
1/4 cup minced parsley
1/3 cup oil or shortening


