### PATAGONIA.

Interesting News Items Clipped From the Patagonian.

Mr. and Mrs. Fred. Lawson are expected to arrive in Patagonia July 1, where Mr. Lawson will take a position at the mine being operated by J. V. Burge.

Tom Fraser, who has been on a flying trip to Douglas, Bisbee, and other mining camps, returned Wednesday to Patagonia. He reports the mining industry improving.

E. D. Farley was in from the Hardshell Tuesday. He says everything is moving satisfactorily at the camp, and that the ore is still showing up well on the Bender claims.

Carlos Valenzuela and his father, Val Valenzuela, Sr., commenced assessment work this week on the April group of mining claims, near the Arizona-European mine, which are owned by Val Sr.

H. H. McCutchan is in charge of assessment work at the World's Fair mine. Twenty-five men will be necessary to complete the work before July 1. There will be two shifts of 12 each at the mine until the work is finished.

Dave Dowd, well known miner, formerly located in Patagonia but recently a resident of Kingman, Arizona, has returned to town. He is doing the assessment work at the Exposed Reef mine, in which he is interested with Brocky Shannon.

Pat Perez is sending in some high grade ore from the Apache group of claims in the Alto country. The ore is being sorted, sacked and freighted into Patagonia. Burros are being used for the work of bringing the ore to the loading platform.

Scheler and Dawson were in town Monday from the Blue Lead mine, in the Santa Ritas, where they recently struck some good ore. They are disappointed at not being able to stope the ground owing to a clause in their bond and lease prohibiting that form of mining, it is said.

Miss Geraldine and Richard McCormick, children of Mrs. E. D. Farley, who have been attending St. Joseph's academy at Prescott, are spending the summer with their mother at the Commercial hotel. Richard won the tennis cup this year and last year in games with Prescott High school.

Supervisor O. F. Ashburn has a force of cowboys engaged in rounding up all 3 year olds and upward having his brand. The cattle will be shipped from Sonora in the near future. Mr. Ashburn recently shipped several hundred head to the Imperial Valley, where they were put on pasture by western purchasers.

County Attorney A. H. De Riemer was in Patagonia Saturday night on official business. Among other things attended to by the C. A. a notice was posted at the World's Fair mine to the effect that the property would be sold June 28 for taxes amounting to more than \$20,000. A notice for the sale of personal property also was posted at the Hosey mine, in the Santa Ritas, to satisfy a judgment in favor of Col. R. R. Richardson.

### ROLLIN JONES INDICTED.

Phoenix, June. -- Rollin P. Jones, Lehi school principal who was indicted today by the special grand jury inquiring into activities of the Ku Klux Klan in Maricopa county, surrendered late this afternoon and gave bond of \$2,000. Two charges were placed against Jones, both involving Lois Waller, sixteen year old pupil of the Lehi school. Jones, married, and the father of five children, recently was spirited away from his home and was flogged by a band of masked men. J. N. Waller, father of the girl, and his son, B. F. Waller, were tried on charges of assault in connection with the whipping of Jones but the case resulted in a jury disagreement. Their second trial in scheduled for September.

Oatman—Big mill at Gold Road mine to be re opened after long shut down.

Douglas—Copper Queen smelter has increased its monthly production from 6,000,000 pounds to 7,500,000 pounds and has lately added about 50 men to payroll.

Wickenburg—Monarch mine near here to resume operations.

Prescott—Blast furnace of United Verde smelter in Clarkdale again operating.

Prescott—Southwest Metals Co. mill ready to receive shipments.

St. Johns—Work on Apache county's \$325,000 highway to start at once.

ARIZONA PAYS OVER MILLION.

The number of federal personal income tax returns for the calendar year ended December 31, 1920, filed in Arizona, was 24,812, representing net income amounting to \$67,280,483 and a tax (normal and surtax) of \$1,325,905.

As compared with 1919 the above figures show a growth of 4,617 in returns filed, as well as an increase in the total net income amount to \$5,846,189, but a decrease in the tax of \$490,994.

The proportion of the population of the United States who filed personal income tax returns for the calendar year ending December 31, 1920, was 6.85 per cent; whereas the proportion of the population of Arizona filing returns was 7.43 per cent. The average net income per return for the United States was \$3,269.40, whereas for Arizona it was \$2,711.61 and the average amount of the personal income tax per return in the United States was \$148.08, while for Arizona it was \$53.44.

The greatest number of returns, 11,235, in any one class was filed by persons with income between \$2,000 and \$3,000. Eight hundred, one hundred and eighteen persons showed income of from \$1000 to \$2000. In other classes the following number of returns were filed: \$3000 to \$4000—2,906; \$4000 to \$5000—1020; \$5000—1020; \$5000 to \$6000—53; \$6000 to \$7000—292; \$7000—292; \$7000 to \$8000—164; \$8000 to \$9000—76; \$9000 to 10,000—79; \$10,000—79; \$10,000 to \$11,000—52; \$11,000 to \$12,000—43; \$12,000 to \$13,000—20; \$13,000 to \$15,000—22; \$15,000 to \$20,000—54; \$20,000 to \$25,000—22; \$25,000 to \$30,000—20; \$30,000 to \$40,000—22; \$40,000 to \$50,000—12; \$50,000 to \$60,000—3.

Only three residents of Arizona filed returns showing incomes of more than \$60,000 and less than \$90,000. The incomes of the three totaled \$225,313, and of this amount Uncle Sam collected \$44,822. No income of more than \$90,000 was filed in Arizona.
