Moderation and conservatism instead of risk and excitement are now features of the financial centers. Those upon whom re aponsibility for results in legitimate lines of industry rest will be heartily glad that the way is cleared for their success through the present year so far as matters relating to money markets and the country's finances are concerned.

Last week's election should be satisfactory to the republicans of Michigan as the majority for their candidates on the state ticket will be in the vicinity one hundred thousand. The vote on the ammendment to the constitution making it possible to continue the employment of prison labor was evidently largely assisted through the desire to remove all hindrances to the proposed binder-twine plant so earnestly wrged by Governor Warner. In some cities and counties the demo. crats described their state candidates and adopted other organization names in order to assit in the election of local candidates. As the last state contest preliminary to the important presidential election of next year the results of last week's voting was decidedly helpful to Michigan republicans and the purposes their party represents.
