The financial situation which caused the business sky to be threatened a little while ago is now said to be clear again. All danger of business disturbance from that source is declared to have passed by. Indeed the situation is in many respects better than before the flurry, by reason of the lesson it conveyed. Moderation and conservatism instead of risk and excitement are now features of the financial centers. Those upon whom responsibility for results in legitimate lines of industry rest will be heartily glad that the way is cleared for their success through the present year so far as matters relating to money markets and the country's finances are concerned.

Last week's election should be satisfactory to the republicans of Michigan as the majority for their candidates on the state ticket will be in the vicinity one hundred thousand. The vote on the amendment to the constitution making it possible to continue the employment of prison labor was evidently largely assisted through the desire to remove all hindrances to the proposed binder-twine plant so earnestly urged by Governor Warner. In some cities and counties the democrats deserted their state candidates and adopted other organization names in order to assist in the election of local candidates. As the last state contest preliminary to the important presidential election of next year the results of last week's voting was decidedly helpful to Michigan republicans and the purposes their party represents.

Some further movement of permanent value may come from the recent meeting of prominent representatives of labor and capital at the home of Andrew Carnegie in New York. An arrangement and agreement which will give more force and value to arbitration legislation than it has thus far seemed to possess, is one very desirable result such a gathering might assist. The enforced idleness of thousands of men, closing down of important industries, the destruction of properties, the commission of various crimes, even to murder, are some of the accompaniments of past contests between capital and labor which should never be repeated. They suggest barbarism rather than civilization's best days, and the means through which this repetition shall be prevented would rank in the highest importance as a more than national achievement. It is encouraging to know that this is the view of the subject now held by the most influential representatives of both capital and labor.

For the benefit of those within other political lines who may be interested in the matter, it can be stated with little fear of contradiction, that if President Roosevelt is not again the republican nominee for president the nominee will be a man who will best represent the president's sympathies and purpose in legislative and national directions. Mr. Roosevelt can be his own successor if he will, but whether he is or not there is no opposition to his efforts and accomplishments within the republican party which would receive the slightest attention in a national convention. President Roosevelt has not in a single instance departed from the spirit and declaration of the national republican platform accompanying his candidacy for president, and there has been no change in party sentiment or purpose which would permit opposing action in the next convention.

The New York Times has sent a number of letters to Michigan asking as to whether President Roosevelt is as popular and as strong with the voters as he was at the time of his election. It is hardly to be questioned that the answers to the New York paper's query will show that Roosevelt has lost nothing of his popularity with all classes of people in this state. He may have disregarded implied obligations to political friends and disappointed former personal friends, but he has not broken a promise nor has he failed in any of his obligations to duty as he sees it. His disposition may not be angelic and he may overmuch incline to controversy and contest, but his controversies and contests thus far have been just such, a very large majority of the people could enjoy and cordially approve.
