lines of public sewerage and drainage,
for and within the fire limits of said
city, and such other portions of said
city as will naturally require outlet
for Sewerage and Drainage be estab-
lished, would report favorable and
recommend that the prayer of the
petitioners be granted.

making surveys of lines, and estimates
of cost of expenses of sewerage and
drainage within the fire limits, as
heretofore petitioned, be, and the
same is hereby referred to the com-
mittee on grading and sidewalks,
with instructions to cause such surveys
of lines and estimates of costs of con-
struction, to be made as prayed in
said petition and report the same to
this Council, with their recommenda-
tion, as to the lines to be adopted.

Ald. Wells presented the following
resolution, which on unanimous con-
sent being given, was placed on its
passage and passed. Ayes 5. Nays 0.

RESOLVED by the Common Council
of the City of Owosso that a sum
not to exceed seventy-five (\$75.00) be
expended on Fayette Square for the
purpose of setting out trees and seed-
ing down the said square. The work
to be done under the supervision of
the Committee on Public Grounds.

On motion a committee of three
was appointed by the Mayor, con-
sisting of Ald. Lewis, Wells and the
City Attorney to settle with the City
Treasurer.

On motion the Council Adjourned
