Regular meeting of the Common Council of the city of Owosso, Mayor Calkins in the chair.

The committee on Claims and Accounts reported favorably on the accounts presented, with the exception of those of J. J. Parnelly and J. W. Stockwell; the report was accepted, unanimous consent was given, and the accounts allowed. Ayes 7, nays 0.

The same committee also reported in favor of allowing the accounts of J. D. Evans, F. E. Welch, Fred Morse, L. Van Dusen, and witness and juror fees in Lee case as presented, and J. E. Turner's bill of \$60.90 at \$30.45. The report was accepted and the accounts allowed. Ayes 7, nays 0.

The committee on Ways and Means to whom was referred the petition to furnish water for sprinkling Main street reported the matter back to the Council without recommendation. Upon motion the committee on Supplies and Expenditures were instructed to contract with L. E. Woodard for water at the rate of \$50 for the balance of the year. Ayes 7, nays 0.

On motion the report of the committee on Ways and Means on the petition of M. B. Faugner was taken from the table.

A motion to adopt the report was lost by the following vote: Ayes, Ald. Frieske, Titcomb and Wiley—3; nays, Ald. Keyte, Robbins, Wells and Wolverton—4.

On motion the resolution passed at the special meeting in regard to giving L. E. Woodard \$2,500 for public improvements was reconsidered.

On motion the resolution was amended so as to make the two orders payable January 1, 1888. Ayes 7, nays 0.

Ald. Wells offered the following resolution, which was accepted and adopted. Ayes 7, nays 0.

Resolved, That the Mayor appoint a committee of three to arrange plans and probable cost of a new bridge over the Shiawassee river on Mulberry street, and report to the Council as soon as possible.

The Mayor named as such committee, Ald. Frieske, Keyte and Robbins.

The committee on Grading and Sidewalks was instructed to have a culvert put in across Main street on the west line of Shiawassee street.

Ald. Wells introduced an ordinance to provide for the trimming of shade trees and for cutting grass and weeds in front of all premises in the city of Owosso. The ordinance was read the first and second times by its title.

The Council then adjourned.

Death From Morphine.

A ONE-LEGGED MAN TAKES TEN GRAINS IN A GLASS OF BEER AND DIES.

TRINIDAD, Col., July 6.—[Special.]—Today at 2 o'clock, Morris Kavanagh went into a drug store and asked for ten grains of morphine. On being asked what he wanted it for answered that it was for two women, and the druggist wanted to divide it accordingly, but he said they would do it themselves.

After receiving the morphine he went to the Bridge saloon, where he had been passing a good deal of his time, and calling two of his newly made acquaintances up to the bar called for the beer. He then took the envelope with the morphine in it, emptied it into the glass of beer, and before they could prevent him he had drank it down. After drinking it he said: "Boys, this is my last drink." They at once called a physician and he used his best efforts to save his life but they were of no avail.

Nothing particular can be found out who he is, only that his name is Morris Kavanagh, and that he comes from Owosso, Michigan. While freighting near Leadville his team ran away with him, breaking both legs. One was amputated and the other disabled. He used crutches. In his pocketbook was found a number of railway maps and two photographs, one of a young lady and the other of a small girl child. They seem to be of his family, as they both resemble him. Several small papers with addresses of Michigan people were also found in his pockets.

The above is taken from a paper handed us by Mr. Jas. Williams, and is in part true. Mr. Kavanagh did attempt to commit suicide, but was unsuccessful. His father, John Kavanagh, has received letters and papers stating that he is improving and that he would be cared for until well.
