Shipped A Vealer.

The following report is given in order that some who may have calves and do not know what to do with them may learn at least one way to handle them.

On Monday of last week H. P. Wettengel shipped a calf by express to the Oklahoma City stock yards that weighed 200 pounds when just eight weeks old. The calf sold for \$9. per 100, bringing \$18.00, and from this was deducted 25 cents for yardage and 40 cents for selling. The express was "only" \$4.25, leaving a net amount of \$13.10.

He had the crate shipped back by express and had some drayage to pay here, both of which are optional with the shipper.

Inspected Cattle.

W. L. Hiatt, a veterinarian in the employ of the federal government, arrived here from Oklahoma City Thursday noon and went out west of town about twenty miles to the ranch of Ira Carr to inspect some cattle. Mr. Carr has just shipped in 800 head from New Mexico which have been exposed to the scab so he will have to dip the whole bunch.

Mr. Hiatt has been in the employ of the government for over eighteen years and during that time has traveled Oklahoma from corner to corner many times. While here he visited a short time with H. P. Wettengel, who is a cousin of his wife.
