Buy Mechanical Milker.

J. W. Bickford reports the sale of a milking machine to Thomas Morgan of Prairie Creek, the first in this county and probably the first in Oregon east of The Dalles. The machine will cost laid down close to \$700, and it will save nearly that much in wages the first year. It is run by a steam engine. The milkers are of rubber that fit over the teats and draw the milk by suction, similar to sucking by a calf. Each machine milks two cows, and as the machine ordered by Mr. Morgan is double it will have a capacity of milking four cows in seven minutes.
