ARBOR DAY PROCLAMATION

Interest and pride in the growth of tree and shrub and vine and flower are as old as civilization. Man has ever found profit and pleasure and unselfish joy in the nurture of trees and other plant life. In our country the love of and interest in arboriculture in its various forms has developed the custom of dedicating one day of the year to its promotion.

In harmony with this custom and to encourage the planting and culture of trees on our broad spreading prairies, I, Frank M. Byrne, Governor of the State of South Dakota do hereby designate Tuesday, the 22nd day of April, 1913, as

ARBOR DAY

and request the people of the state to observe and celebrate the day as such by planting trees, shrubs, vines and flowers about their homes, along the highways and around the grounds of schools and other public buildings.

On the farms and about country houses do I particularly recommend such planting, with a view to enhancing the beauty and comfort and even the value of the farm homes of the State.

I call upon the teachers and students in our schools and educational institutions, especially, to observe the day in spirit and fact by planting trees and shrubs and vines and flowers in all convenient places, accompanied by such appropriate exercises and ceremonies as will give fitting recognition to the historic and aesthetic significance of the day.
