Common Council-Regular Meeting. THURSDAY, May 28.

Ald. Fogg, from Figance committee, reported favorably on sundry accounts, which were ordered to be paid. He also submitted the report of the Water Tax Collector, which was received. Ald. A. L. Davis, from Cemetery Committee, submitted the report of the Sexton, for the month of April, showing 34 interments for that month; 27 whites, and 7 blacks-32 from the city, and 2 from

Ald. Fogg, from Special Committee, to whom was referred the petition of the Mechanics' Institute, for permission to build rooms over the present Market House, 25 feet in height, between the north and south wings of the Market-house, reported that the committee had hal a conference with a committee on the part of the Institute, and recommended that the proposition be acceded to, on certain conditions. The proposition is, to grant the Mechanic's Institute the privilege of erecting a building for their use, over the Market-house, and have the free use of the same for fifty years. The committee of the Board of Mayor and Aldermen, recommend in favor of granting the privilege, provided the Mechanic's Institute commence the improvement by the 1st of May, 1858, and finish it by the 1st of July, 1859, and when the Institute may be ready to go to work, the Mayor is to appoint a committee, who, shall, in conjunction with a similar committee on the part of the Institute, draw up a written contract, specifying the terms and the privileges to be extended to each party.

In the department of Piano Fortes, the committee, uniting into one class, as is obviously correct, the Grands, Semi Frands and Parlor Grands, recommend the following awards:
Chickering & Sons, for their Grands, Semi-Grands, and Parlor-Grands, for most decided and meritorious improvements a Geld Medal.

Chickering & Sons, for the two best Equare Piano Fortes, of Seven Octavo each, the first Sliver Medal.

The committee, in coming to a decision upon the merits of the several instruments of which they have just determined their award, were of entire unanimity. They did not hesitate for a moment in deciding that the Grand Piano Fortes from the justip celebrated house of the Messrs, Chickering & Sons, were not only altogether manifestly superior to all competitors at the present Exhibition, but were an equally manifest, and greatly advanced improvement over the well-commended product in of the same establishment offered at anterior Exhibitions. And the committee not only feel it to be a pleasure, but an obvious duty, to congratulate the present heads of this long established house, that they have so well sustained its high repute. 


