Mrs. Virgie Watson, of Groveland, is visiting at T. F. Gilliam's at this writing.

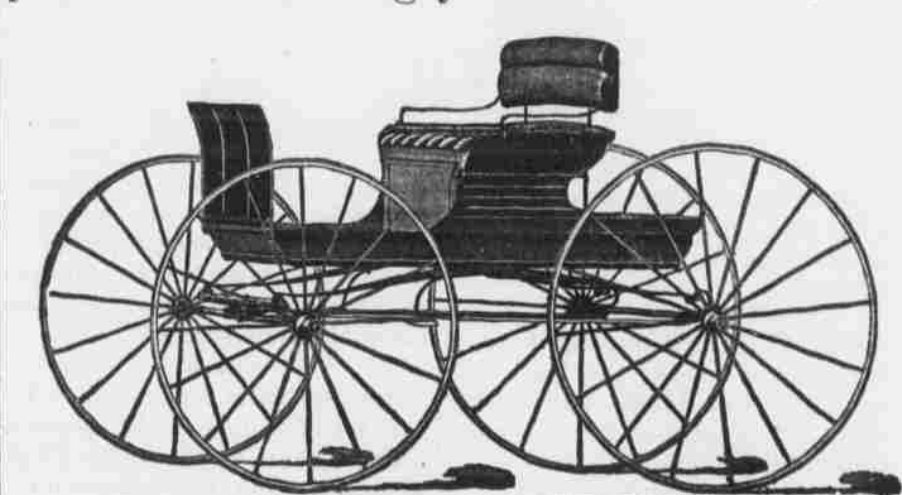
Mr. Nathaniel Fanner is not expected to live but a few hours.

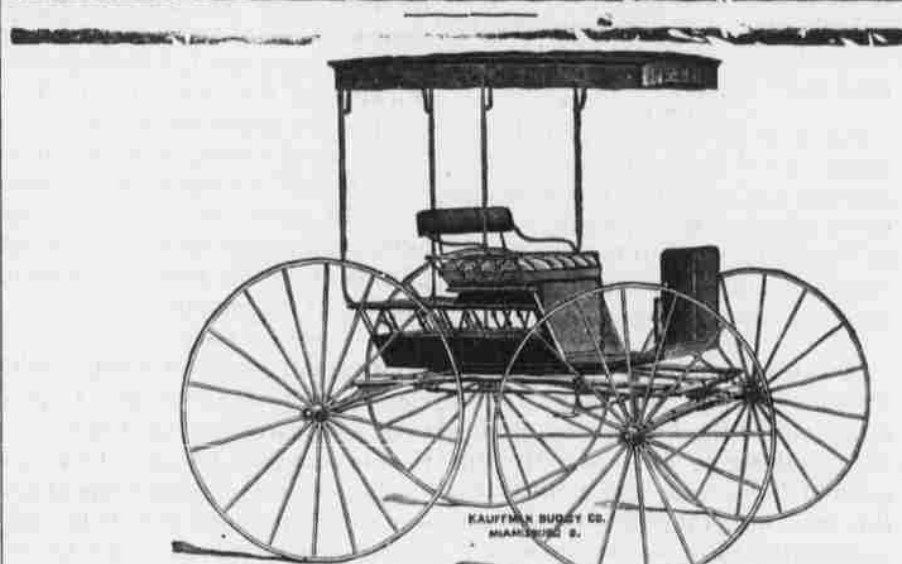

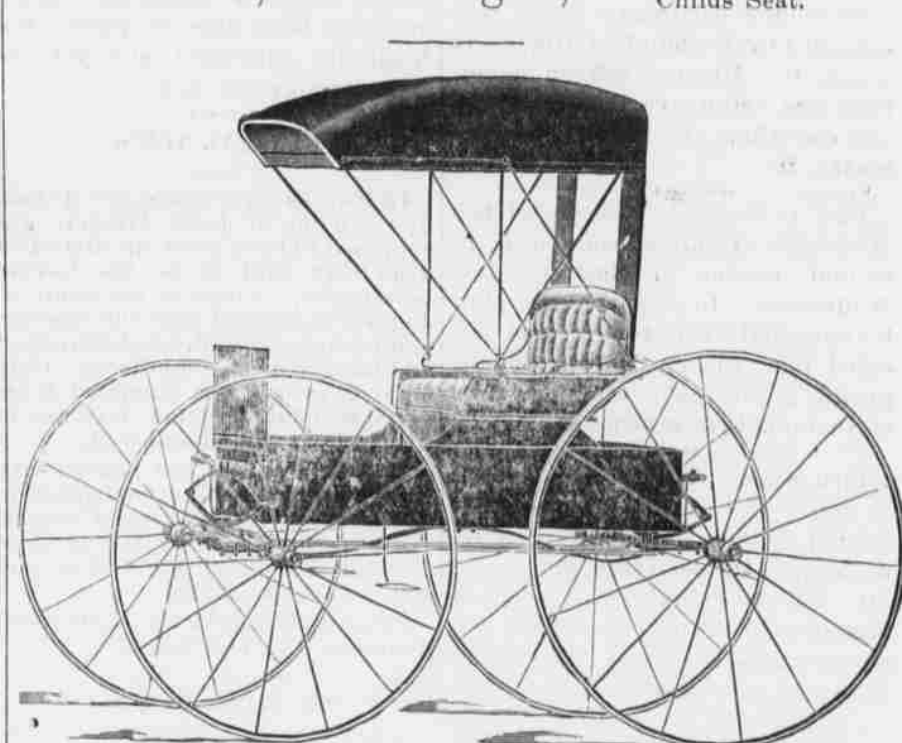

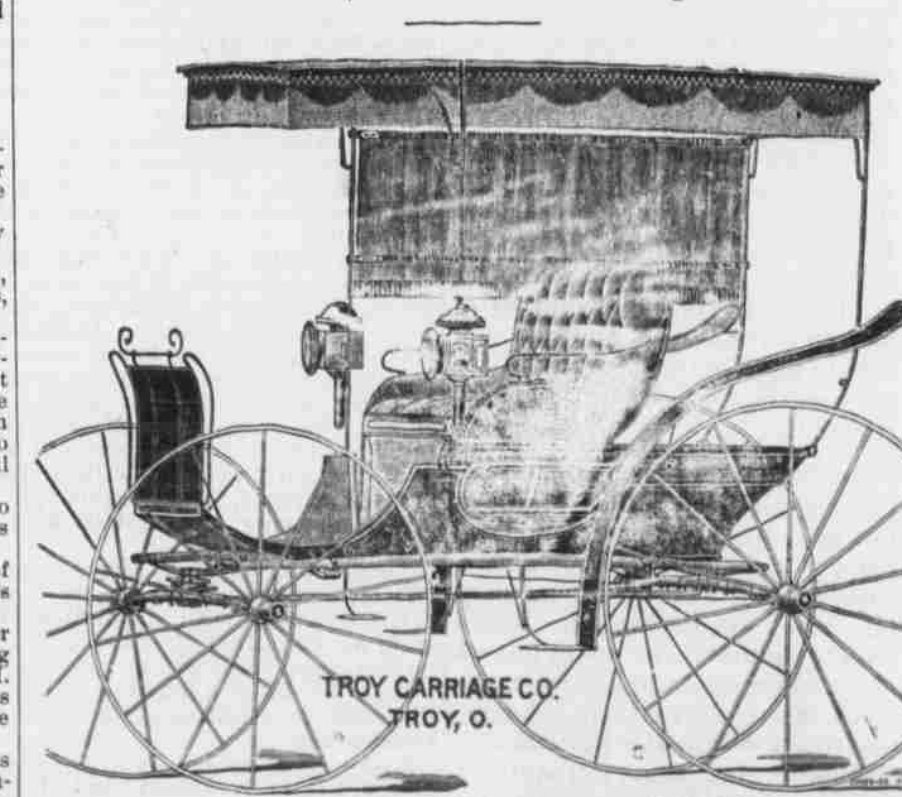
