### MEETING.

WINCHESTER, July 7th.

At a meeting of the citizens of Winchester, comprising both ladies and gentlemen,

Dr. Lewis Metcalf was called to the chair and W. J. Slatter appointed Secretary.

The President having explained the object of the meeting to be the arrangement of a Pie-Nic at Sewanee Mr. Colyar offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That a Committee of five be appointed, whose duty it shall be to make all necessary arrangements for a trip, by the citizens of Franklin county, to Sewanee on next Friday to meet such persons as may come there from Beresba Springs.

The following named gentlemen were then appointed on said Committee:

F. T. Estill, A. S. Colyar, Dr. S. W. Houghton, N. Frizzell, Jr., and Col. H. Francis.

On motion, Wm. C. Brooks, B. F. McGhee and Thos. S. Logan were added to the committee.

After some very appropriate and entertaining remarks by Messrs. Estill and Colyar on the following resolution, it was unanimously adopted.

Resolved, That in view of the magnitude and importance of the "University of the South," and especially of its identity with us, and it being a moral instead of a monied institution it would be ungenerous and illiberal in any citizen of Franklin county to speculate on said University in mountain lands, where they may be required for University purposes.

On motion, Resolved, That the Brass Band of Winchester be requested to attend the meeting at Sewanee.

Resolved, That the ladies be present on the occasion referred to.

Resolved, That the Home Journal be requested to publish these proceedings.

### Kentucky Crops.

The farmers of Logan county are harvesting their wheat crops, most of which turn out better than was anticipated. In Bullitt and Hardin counties, as we believe is the case generally in this State, with rare exceptions, the oat crop is a failure. The rust has ruined it in the counties named, so that it is hardly worth cutting. The wheat is being harvested, and yields tolerably well. The corn in some parts of those counties is very backward, but looks well. The wheat crop of this State is a short average.—Louisville Courier 25th.

**Type Setting and Distributing Machine.**—Mr. T. Alden, of New York, has invented, after many years of experimenting, a very ingenious machine for the composition and distribution of types. The mysteries of the invention cannot be explained with sufficient brevity for these columns—but the chief merit of the thing, in which it exceeds other contrivances of the kind is—that the type is set and distributed by one and the same machine (by keys) instead of separately as before. The process by which the little bits metal are caught up and put down again just in the right places, with never a blunder except when the human agency at the machine makes one; the way in which the type are fed out and returned again through an endless round, so that the distribution keeps up a constant supply for the composition; and the cunning devices by which a thousand little practical difficulties are overcome, are evidences of a marvelous ingenuity on the part of the inventor, and show what thought and perseverance can accomplish. Mr. Alden thinks that a good compositor, accustomed to manipulate the keys, would be able to set and distribute about 15,000 ems a day. The cost of the machines will probably be from \$1,200 to \$1,500.
