COUNTY CONVENTION.

Proceedings Lengthy but Harmonious—An Acceptable Ticket.

Delegates from the eastern part of the county began dropping into Spearfish, Friday evening, getting on the ground early to see how the land lay. No one could outline what the result would be, but those best acquainted with the true state of affairs, were by no means surprised with the work of the convention after its labors had been performed. However, after the nomination of sheriff it appeared that Mr. O'Brien would capture the office of register of deeds, but Mr. Baker had the strength and got there. Of course Lead had to then have the assessor, and she got it. Good feeling prevailed throughout the entire proceedings, although things were done that might not be considered good politics by more experienced politicians than some who were in the convention.

There were seventy-four delegates—thirty-eight for choice.

Convention was called to order at 1:45 by J. W. Freeman, chairman pro tem of the central committee, who read the following resolution adopted by the committee at a meeting held at 10 o'clock:

"Resolved, That J. W. Freeman of this committee be and is hereby authorized and requested to call the county convention to be held this day to order, and preside there until a chairman pro tem be duly elected."

The call was then read, whereupon Judge Corson was chosen temporary chairman on motion of R. E. Grimshaw, and Max Hoehn temporary secretary on motion of J. D. Patton.

The chair appointed J. A. Harding, D. P. Flood, Joseph Wells, John Gray, R. E. Grimshaw, George Willard, Charles K. Wheedon a committee on credentials.

On permanent organization and order of business G. V. Ayres, J. D. Patton, C. J. Price, C. V. Gardner, Frank Lewis, H. J. Grant and James McQuillan were selected by the chair.

While waiting for the committees to report Judge Corson made a very logical republican speech, bringing forth loud applause. The judge was followed by General Dawson, who always pleases an audience by saying something new and touching to say. Elder Williams also made a few well chosen remarks, at the conclusion of which the committees were ready to report.

Committee on credentials submitted its report, which was adopted.

The committee on permanent organization and rules of order submitted its report, which was adopted, and in substance was as follows: That Dr. J. A. Harding be made permanent chairman, and D. T. Potter secretary; that balloting be by ballot; that the chair appoint a committee of seven to report twenty-five names as delegates to the district convention, and a committee of three from each commissioner district to select a central committee to serve the ensuing two years; that nominations be made in the following order: Sheriff, treasurer, register of deeds, auditor, attorney, superintendent of schools, probate judge, assessor, surveyor and coroner. The report was adopted.

The chairman was escorted to the stage by McPherson and Patton.

On motion of C. V. Gardner, H. G. Palmer was appointed assistant secretary.

Chair appointed R. E. Grimshaw, Jas McQuillan, D. A. McPherson, D. T. Potter, J. C. Jones, Chas Wheedon, Max Blatt, J. S. Sparks and Max Hoehn to report names to district convention.

Committee to select central committee—First district: L. Reuben, Ira Putnam and J. W. Freeman; Second district: S. B. Crist, J. S. Crooks and H. J. Grant; Third district: J. D. Patton, R. R. Crow and Alex Lee.

Delegates chosen to district convention are: A. E. Frank, D. A. McPherson, H. O. Anderson, Chas Price, Jos Sparks, Max Blatt, J. A. Harding, R. E. Grimshaw, L. W. Valentine, John Wolzmut, E. T. Marshall, W. H. Chas, W. E. Smead, A. J. White, Chas Languth, H. A. Carpenter, J. J. Davenport, Geo Ayres, Jas Carney, H. J. Grant, J. L. Demman, Chas Wheedon, C. C. Grimm, O. W. Jewett, D. P. Flood.

The gentlemen selected for the central committee are: First district—R. E. Grimshaw, F. J. Wasahrough, Deadwood; W. E. Smead, Samuel Roy, Lead; J. W. Freeman, Terreville.

Second district—Brad Wood, Central; L. W. Valentine, Spearfish; W. M. Blake, Crook; J. L. Demman, J. H. Burns, White-wood.

Third district—H. G. Palmer, Postville; Max Hoehn, Sturgis; J. S. Sparks, Fort Meade; W. H. Cable, Sturgis; Alex Lee, Galena.

Harry Trathen and I. R. Crow were appointed tellers by the chair.

Nominations being order, A. J. Knight and Brad Wood were placed before the convention, the ballot resulting 57 to 17 in favor of Knight.

No opposition to K. G. Phillips for the office of treasurer, the rules were suspended and the nomination made by acclamation.

The contest for the office of register of deeds was quite a lively one, requiring seven ballots to decide who was the choice of the convention. Five candidates were placed in nomination for this office, viz: John Baker, C. V. Gardner, F. M. Rood, W. S. O'Brien and James Watt.

First ballot stood—Baker 29, O'Brien 14, Watt 14, Gardner 12, Rood 4.

Second—Baker 26, O'Brien 19, Watt 11, Gardner 17.

Third—Baker 25, O'Brien 19, Gardner 19, Watt 11.

Fourth—Baker 26, O'Brien 20, Gardner 10, Watt 11.

Fifth—Baker 28, O'Brien 22, Gardner 11, Watt 12.

Sixth—Baker 34, O'Brien 22, Gardner 4, Watt 12.

Mr. Gardner withdrew his name.

Seventh ballot—Baker 38, O'Brien 26, Watt 10.

For auditor, R. H. Driscoll was the unanimous choice of the convention.

Col. Parker and W. G. Rice were nominated for the office of county attorney. The ballot resulted with 41 for Rice and 33 for Parker.

Miss Sue Neill was the choice of the convention for superintendent of schools over W. M. Lake, by a vote of 49 to 25.

For probate judge Leonard Gordon and C. W. Mather were placed in nomination, Judge Gordon winning the race by a vote of 52 to 21.

T. J. Sparks the present incumbent was the nominee for assessor over H. A. Carpenter. The vote stood 49 to 35.

A. S. Gates received the nomination for surveyor, and Dr. J. B. Cheney for coroner.

Hank Wright was nominated for coroner, but he generally withdrew in favor of Dr. Cheney, giving as his reason that Doc was a poor man and needed the position.

Near the close of the convention, a resolution was read and adopted, thanking the people of Spearfish for the use of the hall and other hospitalities shown the members of the assembly.

Convention adjourned sine die at about 10 o'clock p. m., with several disappointed aspirants for positions on the ticket.

The ticket is a good one, and every man—and woman, too—on there will be elected. It will meet with the hearty approval of every loyal republican in Lawrence county. The Advertiser will canvass the situation at length in its next issue, showing us plain as possible what we will gain by the election of the ticket as nominated.
