Smith College Club Hold Annual Meeting

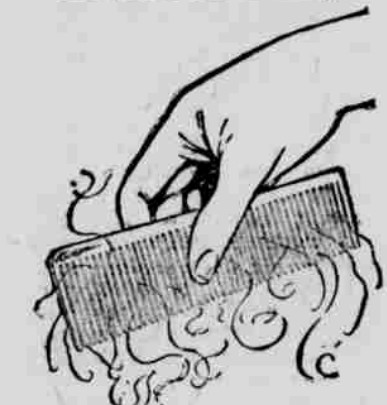

Flowers: Yellow birch, jack-in-the-pulpit, smooth yellow violet, gold thread, common harecup moss, May 18; red cherry, May 20; hobble bush, downy yellow violet, Canada plumb, marsh blue violet, May 21; two-leaved toothwort, wild columbine, May 23; red-berried elder, American fly honeysuckle, large-flowered trillium, shadbush, thin-leaved sedge, low spear grass, early or golden meadow parsnip, twisted stalk, red currant, prickly gooseberry, smooth gooseberry, red haneberry, woodland white violet, black ash, nitewort, false nitewort, May 24.
