Joseph I. Knappenberg was up from Lone on Wednesday boosting for the Bull Moose party. Nix.

Mr. Angelo Carosio, who registered at the Palace Hotel on the 31st of July from San Francisco, died in a room there on Saturday evening last. He was sick when he arrived at Heppner, evidently suffering from a very severe attack of asthma; in fact he stated to Mr. Wilkins who waited on him that he had come to this section of the country to get relief from his sufferings by a change of climate. The hotel management tried to get the man to go to the hospital and receive medical assistance, but he refused to do so and apparently died very suddenly while preparing to retire on Saturday evening. Mr. Wilkins discovered him lying on the floor, dead, about 9 o'clock on Sunday morning when he went up to wait on him. He had removed his shoes and shirt and was lying as though he had fallen off the edge of the bed. Coroner Chick was at once informed and came up from Lone immediately. Upon making an investigation, the coroner concluded an inquest was unnecessary, and the remains were turned over to Undertaker Case awaiting instructions from the man's people in San Francisco. These arrived on Monday and Mr. Case prepared the body for shipment to San Francisco on Tuesday. Mr. Carosio was a man of some means, being a member of the firm of Carosio & Lazzarino, commission merchants of Washington street, San Francisco, and had on his person \$70 in cash, besides papers showing that he was entitled to check on his bank where his firm evidently does business.

There was some lively bidding for the \$40,000 issue of building bonds of School District No. One of Morrow county on last Friday. The School Board met at 10 o'clock to open bids, and upon request from parties from the outside who desired to be present the meeting was continued until 7 o'clock in the evening at which time County Treasurer Gilliam opened bids from various bond dealers of the Northwest and the bonds were awarded to Morris Bros., of Portland at 54 per cent. and a premium of \$909.00. The next highest bid was by Cansey, Foster & Co. of Denver, at the same rate of interest and premium of \$325. The sale is considered a good one, and we are informed by the purchasers that the bonds will be taken up at once, thus putting the district in possession of the funds necessary to push the work on the new school building. The plans for the new school are now in the hands of the Directors and advertisement is being published asking for bids for construction to be filed either with the architect, Mr. E. E. McClaran, at his office in Portland or the Board of Directors in Heppner not later than the 14th of this month.
