FROM THE PACIFIC COAST.

quickess on record.

H., fell overboard from the ahip Northern Empire and was killed.

About twenty houses on Keuroey and Bush streets, San Francisco, were burnt July th; loss \$100,000.—Capt. Doran of the ship Nazarene, was under arrest for shooting three

loss \$100,000.—Capt. Doran of the ship Naz-arene, was under arrest for almoring three-loorning house runners, who attempted to en-ter his vessel and entice away the crew. The men were badly wounded and the captain was held in \$6,000 bail.

A. A. Cohen, receiver of Adams & Co.'s assets, and J. C. Woods, a member of that firm, lave been charged with frauds to the amount of \$400,000, by Judge Chambers, of the late firm of Page, Bacon & Co. The Judge charges that Adams & Co., have been engaged for the last four years in palming off

Judge charges that Adams & Co., have been engaged for the last four years in palming off inferior dust upon Page, Bucon & Co.; that a regular hand of disguised accomplices were maintained in the various mining districts, where gold is bought and sold. The defendants were held to bail. They publish a card promising to refute the charges.
