RIEL'S SPIRIT WILL NOT DOWN.
If the Government of the Dominion of Canada believes that with hanging that patriotic soul, Louis Riel, it wiped out the seeds of discontent among his people, it makes a sad mistake. The cause which led to the Riel rebellion still exists, and what Riel failed to secure by force of arms will be secured by his friends and compatriots either by arms or by ballot. We believe the latter to be the most effective weapon for success. The execution of Riel changed the provincial politics of Quebec. Ever since 1867 the Quebec legislature contained 80 Conservatives and 80 Liberal, and the former party has steadily lost ground and the latter party has steadily gained. When Riel was hanged last November the Conservatives had gained three votes. Last Spring when on a motion to censure the Government for the execution he received fifty-five votes against Conservatives, twenty-four against, or Liberals. Thus the result was taken to the polls, and the result now is thirty-three Liberals, four independent Nationalists and only twenty-eight Conservatives. The National election will undoubtedly hinge on the same issues, and the time is coming fast when Sir John Macdonald will be defeated and driven from the field, and the evils which led to the Riel rebellion righted. Among his people Riel is looked upon as a martyr, and his memory is enshrined in their breasts, and they will never rest until they have righted the wrongs his heart's drain was given to.

CALM AND PEACEFUL.

The closing week of the campaign has come. The politicians are busy, candidates are worried and the organs are all torn up with dissensions among themselves. The Telegram-Herald, thoroughly independent, looks upon the turbulent scene with a calm and peaceful spirit well satisfied that the voters, as a rule, will elect the best men. It is a campaign of man not principle, for the only party with any well defined principle, the Protection, has not a ghost of a show. About Wednesday, just a week before election day, the Telegram-Herald, in the interest of the public at large and particularly of a large class of speculative readers, proposes to tell just who is to be elected. The prophecy will be prepared with some care and it will be sure to be on it.

We sincerely trust that the movement to prevent the shipment of deer out of this state will be prosecuted with vigor. There is a good law covering this offense, but for some years pothunters have shipped large quantities of deer, and as a consequence have made game scarcer than it should be.

Senator Hartman is only about sixty years old, but if he shall live and serve out the term for which he has just been chosen, he will have served more than a quarter of a century in the greatest legislative body in the world. He had been in the Senate just twenty years on the 1st of April last.

Leaving the capital of this State, like our forefathers, is evidently expected to live in condensed atmosphere. For months the city treasury had been empty and large sums of money have been borrowed at high rates, and during these proceedings it appears that there are quite a number of saloon-keepers doing business here who have not paid their license, amounting to some \$60,000.
