We find the claim made by said petitioner to be true and that said land was sold for the taxes of 1880, and was bid in by one Martin Congdon, from whom said John Krem was obliged to re-purchase it for the sum of \$12.00; that the expense of drawing his deed was 75 cents and of recording the same will be

That on the description of land referred to in said petition as having been doubly assessed and sold for the taxes of 1886, said John, Krem paid to the Auditor-General for a certificate of error 25 cents, and the recording of the same will cost 50 cents.
