

Vocational Training Exhibit Receives Very High Praise

"I was very much impressed by the showing at the Tri-State fair of the boys' technical department of Central high school," remarked T. C. Williams, former member of the department of vocational education, State Normal school, Chico, Cal., at present at Hotel Chelsea. "It was interesting, the work was cleverly done and deserving of the highest praise. The successful manual training teacher must have a certain definite theory. The doctor who performs an operation without reference to the why is a poor surgeon. An architect who plans without the inevitable 'why' is courting certain disaster. Just so disaster is likely to follow the work of a teacher who does not understand the 'why' of his work. The wreck of a building is as nothing compared with the disaster of misdirected lives. One authority has stated that in the process of union with the egg and sperm cells there is a possibility of 500,000 combinations. Then how difficult it is to get two individual case alike when this equipment which each child possesses and is the outgrowth of the union mentioned, is acted upon in different ways by the thousands of experiences each child has had. "If you put yeast and sugar and wheat flour together you have wheat bread; if you add rye instead you have rye bread but the law governing yeast is the same in both instances. In dealing with human beings we meet with different materials though the laws of mental development are the same for all the product is different. That is the reason I lay so much stress upon the 'why' of vocational training."

REDOUBLE WATCH FOR RED SUSPECTS

Police Saturday redoubled their watch for I. W. W. suspects following the release Friday of Joseph Hiller, Russian, and Mrs. Nattie Hubbard, who had been detained for several days at headquarters as alleged radical sympathizers. Hiller, the officers said, left for Detroit immediately after he was freed. He was taken in a South Lauderdale street house and at the time papers an I. W. W. flag and other literature confiscated.

Crews which detectives said might lead to the arrest of a prominent Memphis merchant in connection with I. W. W. movements are being followed. The merchant is said to have been an active pro-German during the war. Eight I. W. W. books were in police hands Saturday. They were found Friday night on a seat in the Queen theater, North Main street motion picture house.

Movies Lead All Other Industries In Pacific State

"Photoplays are California's biggest industry," announced F. C. H. Larkin, of Los Angeles, formerly in the oil business, which interests me, as I am a fairly large producer, was the leader but it has fallen far behind. The erstwhile humble movie has \$150,000,000 invested in and around my city whereas oil, which formerly had the lead, has only \$30,000,000 invested there. "In our city the movies annually spend \$120,000,000 and the amount is rapidly increasing. All the studios of any importance are in Los Angeles territory with the exception of one small one in San Mateo, near San Francisco, and it has just been established. Some years ago in our town there was considerable agitation against the movies on account of moral conditions. But all that has been changed and changed for the better."

SCHOONER ABANDONED. MOBILE, Ala., Oct. 2.—Information was received here last night that hope of salvaging the four-masted schooner Three Marys, 1,425 tons, Marshall master, reported abandoned in the gulf Wednesday, off Mobile bar, had not been given up. New York Property Assessment Raised. NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—Real estate in New York city will have an assessed valuation of \$9,608,017,467 for 1921, the board of taxes and assessments announced. This is an increase of \$1,399,007,494 over the present year. Value of taxable personal property was placed at \$785,947,400, a decrease of \$155,874,550, due to exemptions permitted by a new law.

HOUSTON, Texas, Oct. 2.—In final instructions issued today to delegates to the reunion of Confederate veterans here Oct. 5 to 8, veterans were reminded by Gen. N. B. Forrest of the Sons of Confederate Veterans, general secretary of the reunion committee, to bring their own blankets.

CRAPENTERS STRIKE. WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.—Work on millions of dollars' worth of building in Washington was halted yesterday by a strike of union carpenters, who refused to accept \$1 an hour in lieu of their demand for \$1.25 an hour. Union officials said 2,500 men were affected by the walkout and the contractors did not dispute the figures. The carpenters had been receiving 95 cents an hour.

FIRM LOSES SHIPS. WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.—Withdrawal of five vessels from the operation of the Jacksonville Shipping corporation, at Jacksonville, Fla. for "inefficient management," was announced by the shipping board. The ships have been in the cargo service between Jacksonville, Cuba and Central America. The service will be continued, it was said, by allocation of the vessels to some other concern.
