It Spends Much of Its Time in Considering Bridges.

At the session of the county board held yesterday the petitions of the Chicago & Northwestern, the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy, and the Chitax on their property were referred to who wanted "a retraction." the county attorney, with instructions to report at the June meeting.

The county attorney was also instructed to secure from the secsetary of state, a certified copy of the sworn county, of all property used exclus-ively in the operation of the roads, exclusive of the rights of way.

The committee reported against building a bridge on Vaughan avenue until a change was made in the direction of the street; also against the request of the city for a bridge on Seventh street, and in regard to the bridge on Union evenue, that no action should be taken until the whole right of way was secured by the city.

In regard to county bridges, the committee reported adversely on the petition for a bridge northwest of the Crescent City depot; also against a bridge near the north line of section


