Opening the Sewer Ditch-Beatrice Statesmen Visit the Bluffs - A Big Mortgage-Other Gatherings of the News Hunters.

STABBING AFFRAY AT WESTON

Coupling With Sticks. The inquest held in the case of David Kuhns, who was killed at the freight transfer in this city on Saturday evening ast, brought nothing of importance to

A number of witnesses were put on the stand who testified as to the Union Pacific issuing the belts and sticks to the switchmen to do the coupling with, but they were not compelled to use them, as shown by the fact that since Kuhns had been killed few if any switchmen

use them.
C. M. Hobbs testified that "possibly the scabbard hindered their movements," but didn't know that they were in the

George Wilson swore he used the stick te couple cars with, but that it was un-hendy, and he'd "sooner lose a finger than his life," as with a stick a switch-man's hands were safe, but he thought his life was not, as there wes danger of the scabbard becoming fast to a car, and the switchman being drawn under and killed. That in wearing the scabbard it caught in the ear on a man's mounting one and was liable to make him miss his grab, and it was in the way in all cases. On cross examination he said that since the accident to Kuhns 'no one wears them or uses them," and that there is more danger to a man in wearing and using them than without.

A. E. Loucks, another switchman, heard the ears that Kuhns was to couple thump together, and turning around saw the car jolt as if going over something. Soon he saw Kuhns, after the car passed over him, roll from the track as if trying to get out of danger.
The evidence went to show that all the

switchmen in the yards here prefer to use their hands in coupling, even at the risk of losing a few tingers. The jury brought in the following ver-

diet: An inquisition holden at Council Bluffs, in Pottawattamie county, on the 1st day of December, A. D. 1885, before D. M. Connell, coroner of said county, upon the body of David R. Kuhns, there lying dead, by the jurors whose names are hereunto subscribed. The said jurors upon their oaths do say that the said Dr. R. Kuhns came to his death from inju-ries received While coupling cars in the Union Pacific yards at the transfer on Saturday, November 28, at about 5 o'clock p. m. We further find that while there is no evidence to show that the accident was caused by the using of the coupling stick and belt, in the opinion of the jury that while they may save accidents to hands, they endanger the life of every one using the same.


