I asked who was there and no response came; told them I would shoot if they didn't leave. The third time they came back they tried the back door and windows, then went to the front door again. I warned them that I would shoot, but they shook the door so hard I expected it would burst in. I then shot through the door, it being so dark I could not see anyone outside. 
