The board of directors of the Council Bluffs National Bank held a meeting Saturday and elected L. W. Tuttle president and T. J. Evans vice president. James N. Brown remains as cashier.

The boys had a special from Captain Russell yesterday, saying he would arrive home from his wedding trip on a fast freight last night, and they were preparing to receive him with due enthusiasm.

Work was continued yesterday on the improvement of Judge James' brick block, although it was Sunday. The room being open and there being liability of great damage in case of rain, was the reason assigned.

A telephone message was received from the waterworks Saturday night, asking the police to come down and suppress a fellow who was drunk and terrorizing the neighborhood with a revolver. When the police arrived the fellow had subsided of his own accord.

A tramp hanging about the vicinity of the Chicago & Northwestern depot, caused some alarm among some of the women living in that vicinity. He was arrested and given the name of Nick Elenberger, although it was explained to him that he was not to be given him this name.

**Marked by Marcus.**

M. Marcus, who shot the man Bronz

in Grand Island on Tuesday morning

last, came into the Council Bluffs Bee

office on Saturday morning and explained

the shooting in the following:

"Monday night was very dark and

rainy. Myself and clerk slept in the

store in Grand Island. About 11 o'clock

April 6th to open a branch store there.

About 3:30 o'clock Tuesday morning some

one rapped at the store door and shook

it. They went away and came the second

time. I then shot the fellow. I shot sev-

eral were in the party. I asked who was

there and no response came; told them I

would shoot if they didn't leave. The

third time they came back they tried the

back door and windows, then went to the

front door again. I warned them that

I would shoot, but they shook the

door so hard I expected it would

burst. I then shot through the door,

it being so dark I could not see anyone

outside. After the shot the shaking of

the door became more vigorous, so I shot

again, after which all became quiet. I

stood at the foot of my bed and listened

for fully half an hour, when I heard

groans. My clerk and I then went out-

side and found a man groaning. He was

shot in the eye. I immediately went for

the police; they had seen the man sev-

eral times that night on the streets and

had threatened to arrest him if they saw

him again. On Tuesday morning myself

and clerk went outside to look for him.

At the trial we were both discharged. Marcus

says he doesn't know what condition

Bronz is in, as he has not seen him since

he notified the police.
