Grain Markets Strong and All Close with Substantial Gains.

CORN AND OATS BOTH UP HALF A CENT

Provisions Webbly and Demand Fairly Good-Heavy Cattle Re-

coipts and Large Sales

Are Made.

CHICAGO, Dec. 13 .- All the grain markets were strong today and closed at sub-stantial advances. In wheat the continued falling of of receipts in the northwest was the main factor. May and December each closed about %c higher; corn and oats advanced about 1/2 each; previsions closed

Slygice lower.

Opening prices in wheat were practically unchanged from yesterday, May starting at 65 1-86 60 kg. Northwest receipts were comparatively small, but then this was offset by a decline of 3-8d in futures and ld for spot at Liverpool. For a few minutes prices were about at a standstill with a very narrow trading, but the demand increased rapidly and inside of the first half hour's trading the May price had been holsted to 65 5-8c, around which point the market swung for the greater part of the session. Shorts were good buyers and many longs, acting on the belief that prices were in for a good advance, increased their holdings. Apparently the rapid decline in farmers deliveries in the northwest, as shown by the receipts at Minneapolis and Duluth, overshadowed everything else in its influence on traders. Argentine news was favorable and early reports from the seaboard did not indicate very bright prospect for a continued good foreign demand for American wheat, one cable from Germany refusing offerings on the ground that Russia was offering wheat under American parity. Nevertheless, the local sentiment was emphatically buillish and even at the good advance wheat did not come out in very great quantities.

Northwest receipts were 84c cars compared with 1,531 last week and 582 a year ago. Chicago receipts were 222 cars, ten of contract grade. Total primary receipts were 1,173,000 bushels. The increase in the world's visible was put at 3,24,000 bushels, about what was expected. Last year the increase was less than 400,000 bushels. Near the end of the session reports of heavy shipping orders here for St. Louis and the seaboard proved an additional stimulus to buying and May, which up to that time had been steady at around 655-8c, advanced rapidly to 68c. Some reports put the eastern shipping orders here as high as 709,000 bushels. May closed firm at 657-8£66c.

Corn was higher and active. Receipts were fairly large-466 cars—while the mand increased rapidly and inside of the first half hour's trading the May price had

Onts, though rather dull, were firm. Receipts were large—501 cars—but the strength of wheat and corn made shorts uneasy and caused a good deal of scattered buying. Offerings were not large. The shipping demand was good. May ranged from 86c to 284c and closed 3-864c higher at 284c.

Provisions were rather wobbly. The demand was very good, but hog receipts were heavy and packers bought freely of all products. There was also some realizing by recent buyers. Liquidation became lighter late in the day and the market firmed up somewhat. May pork closed 5c lower at 35.85, May lard 24c lower at 35.42½ and May ribs 24c lower at 35.4514.
