Attempt to Force Crown Colony Rule Meets with Defeat in Island-Want Annexation.

KINGSTON, Jamaica, March 28.-(Associited Press Correspondence.)-The political erisis that has arisen over the new tariff bill continues a deadlock, which must continue until after April 4. During the last two previous days the island was on the eve of rebellion against the attempt of the government to coerce the representatives of

Realizing at last the full gravity of the situation, Sir Augustus made proposals for a compromise, but the representatives would accept no terms which did not include the abandonment of all coercive measures. The government, unable to concede this point without the consent of Joseph Chamberlain, secretary of state for the colonies, proposed an adjournment until April 4, and this was

agreed to. The moral victory thus secured by the people served for the present to calm the excitement. No one doubts that Mr. Chamberlain will yield and abandon the attempt to force crown colony rule on Jamaica, as he has on Antigua, Dominica and Trini-
