CLEVELAND, O., Oct. 5 .- Clutched in each others' arms two young men fell from the fourth story of a Lake Shore to their death on the pavement below, at o'clock this evening.

The seismographs at the weather bureau The seismographs at the weather bureau recorded another earthquake beginning about nine hours, five minutes p. m., seventy-five meridian time. October 1. The distinctive features of the record consist in the long duration of the earthquake and especially the long duration of the relatively strong motion. The amplitude of the strong motion, as recorded at Washington was only about 0.3 of a millimeter, which is much less than in the case of either the San Francisco or the Valparaiso earthquakes. The record indicates, however, that the disturbance was at a great distance from Washington, in fact Grandview Building association is a case which was set for trial at the last term of court, but which was not reached.
