Sooner or later there will have to be some complaint filed against some minor under 18 for the lilegal use of tobacco, and this communication is mailed to you in the hope that no reputable dealer will be involved, should the minor elect to furnish the evidence indicated in section 3 rather than pay the fine imposed in section 2.


