Bodice and Sleeve Trimming



Looped ribbon with hemstitching makes a very attractive bodice and sleeve trimming. Have two rows of hemstitching, two inches apart, down the front of the bodice and middle of the sleeves. Decide on the width of ribbon you wish to use (two inches is a nice width), then cut through the hemstitching on each side for a length a trifle more than the width of the ribbon. (Cutting through the stitching forms picot edges). Run the ribbon through the slits. Have three graduated loops on each side. Three inches below make slits on each side and run the ribbon through. Continue in this way all the way down the front of the bodice and sleeves. This bodice and sleeve trimming smartens a plain silk frock.
