Many people and newspapers too, for that matter, are exercised concerning the make up of the ticket to be voted next fall. They cannot understand how the democrats, populists and free silver men can vote for Bryan and Sewall and Watson on the same ticket or on different tickets, since no name is allowed to appear twice on the Australian ballot and there are two vice presidential candidates and only one presidential nominee. The matter is simple enough. These gentlemen's names do not appear on the tickets or need not. They are voted for by presidential electors whose names appear on the ballot under the respective headings "Democratic Ticket", "Peoples' Party Ticket", or "Free Silver Ticket" as the case may be. These electoral names will all be different—a complete set for each ticket—or they may be put up, half democrats and half (or any other portion) populists with an understanding who they are to vote for if elected, and thus the matter is solved. In most of the Southern states where either the democrats or populists will win anyway, each of those parties can put up a full electoral ticket of its own over their respective state tickets; but in a few Southern states and most of the Northern states where there is danger of the republicans slipping in between it will be necessary for the pope and democrats to combine and put up partial electoral tickets in proportion to their supposed strength, and if elected, all will vote for Bryan and each his party choice for vice-president. However, in a majority of cases the republican victories will obviate the necessity of their voting at all.

Elk Point Courier: The nomination of Hon. A. O. Ringsrud of this city by the republican party of the state for the position of Governor is a recognition of worth, merit and business capacity. ## MOUNTAIN FLOOD

Twenty-five Persons Known to Have Been Drowned in Colorado

And It Is Feared the List May Be at Least Doubled.

Many of Those Who Perished Were Campers From Denver.

DENVER, Colo., July 27.—So far as ascertained 25 people perished in the great floods that swept down upon the towns of Morrison and Golden in the foothills, near Denver. Of this number 19 were from Denver and were campers in Bear Creek canyon. There were many more campers in that vicinity and it is feared that the loss of life will probably be much greater than is now known.

Some reports say that when Bear Creek canyon is fully explored it will probably be found that no less than 50 people perished in the flood. Great anxiety is felt by many families in this city, members of which were camping in the mountains.

#### A Terrific Mountain Storm.

The torrents which rushed down the canyons upon Morrison and Golden and other mountain towns, were caused by a terrific mountain storm, which extended for 100 miles or more. From Boulder, in the North, where the damage was slight, all down the range West, almost to Pueblo, the storm swept its destructive way.

At Morrison and Golden the torrents tore away buildings, uprooted trees, washed out long stretches of railroad tracks, swept away bridges and spread annihilation through the towns. Their work was brief, as the warnings they gave was inadequate, and almost before the citizens of the stricken communities knew what had happened, the floods passed, leaving only a deadly silence and signs of devastation everywhere.

All that could be done in the darkness and confusion was done by the rescuers. Men, women and children were extricated from dangerous predicaments, let down from the roofs of floating houses, helped out of trees and drawn out of the very whirl and death of the torrents. It is feared that lives have been lost at Central City and perhaps at other points in the mountains. There is great difficulty in obtaining accurate information of the extent of the devastation, because of the wires being torn down, railroad tracks swept away and all communication with Denver cut off or interfered with.

The Gulf and the South Park railroads suffered most severely in the loss of tracks and bridges. There are also washouts on the San Fe, the Denver and Rio Grande, and the Florence and Cripple Creek.

#### DID IMMENSE DAMAGE.

West Virginia and Ohio Visited by Heavy Rains and Cloudbursts.

CINCINNATI, July 27.—A special from Wheeling, W. Va., states that the damages from flood and washouts during the past 24 hours in West Virginia and Southeastern Ohio is almost beyond estimation. There was not only an unusual rainfall but cloudbursts at different points, causing small streams to do much more damage than during any of the highest floods ever known in those localities. A dispatch from Caldwell, O., states that the towns of Avia, Belle Valley, Dudley, South Olive, East Union, Harrietsville, Carlisle and other places along the Muskingum river are completely submerged. A dispatch from Sistersville, W. Va., states that the damages in the oil fields will amount to hundreds of thousands of dollars. The riggings have been washed away and the tanks and docks overturned.

#### Damage in Three States.

CINCINNATI, July 27.—Specials to The Commercial-Tribune show damages all over West Virginia, Eastern Kentucky and Southern Ohio from floods.

#### MORE UNSATISFACTORY.

Outlook for Early Revival of Trade Not Favorable.

NEW YORK, July 27.—Bradstreets says: Telegraphic and mail advices from commercial and industrial centers indicate a more unsatisfactory state of trade. Jobbers and retail houses show still farther caution in the matter of securing supplies, buying for actual needs to a degree not heretofore reported. There is no outlook favoring an early revival of trade, while the volume of sales continues light and prices low with a further restriction of credits. Unfavorable crop reports from Nebraska have caused cancellation of some orders and long continued rains in Tennessee have checked business there. Louisiana reports the new rice crop short, and Eastern Washington and Oregon that the long continued dry season has had an unfavorable effect on the wheat crop.

#### Experiments in Soil Culture.

LISBON, N. D., July 27.—The new experimental farm for testing production under the new plan of soil culture, has proved decidedly advantageous and the Northern Pacific railroad officials, who have just examined the crops now growing thereon, are particularly well pleased with the venture, and are quite confident the scheme will prove a great success. The farm is located at Lisbon, adjoining the Soldiers' Home, and comprises about 40 acres.
