It has aroused the people to see the dangerous power the whisky busin as is getting when it utterly corrupts the courts of law so that a judge can use such words as Judge Maynard did in his rebuke to that jury. The effort to pack the juries in the interest of some of our criminals has over-reached, and it will hit the saloon cause harder and harder as time goes by."

TOPEKA, Kan., Feb. 13.-W. A. Harris, United States senator-elect, who is a member of the upper house of the Kansas legislature, has prepared a concurrent resolution, requesting the Kansas senators to vote against the ratification of the general arbitration treaty. The resolution recites that such a treaty would be unwise and unnecessary, and a departure from Washington's admonition in his farewell address to "beware of all entangling alliances."


