Fire broke out in the stacks of Curtis Tally of Sanborn county Tuesday and before it could be restrained had burned over a strip a mile and a half long. The fire spread over a field cut by a header where the stubble was eighteen inches high and the stacks consumed in its course contained about 3,000 bushels of wheat. The telephone system throughout that country district brought about 100 men to the work of subduing the fire.

Commander Blanchard of the state G. A. R. has the privilege of appointing a son or daughter of a veteran of this state to a free scholarship in the national memorial university recently founded at Mason City, Iowa, and solicits applications.

Senator Gamble was waited upon at his office in Yankton on Tuesday morning last by a delegation of noted chiefs of the Santee Indians who went on the warpath in 1862 and murdered so many of the whites at New Ulm and other points in Minnesota. The tribe was receiving annuities from the government previous to that time, but owing to their part in the massacre was cut off. A bill

was introduced some years ago to restore the annuity, and has been pending ever since, and now carries about \$3,000,000 in annuities if it passes. The object of the visit of these representatives of the tribe to Senator Gamble at this time was to thank him for the efforts he had thus far made in their behalf, inform him how small a part of their people as a whole took part in the massacre, and how much the rest of the tribe helped the whites. Some dignified speech-making was indulged in by the red men, plans for the future set forth and the pipe of peace smoked. It was a unique meeting.

Woonsocket's village board turns down all applicants for saloon license on the plea that they are not of suitable character to conduct a saloon.

The foundation for a new brick veneered opera house on the ground floor has been begun at Aberdeen. It will be capable of seating 1,500 people.

There is a much heralded filing of articles of incorporation at Pierre for a farmers' co-operative exchange company, with an authorized capital of fifty millions of dollars. This sounds like a big thing, theoretically, an enormous trust. But because the incorporation has been recorded at Pierre it is not necessarily a South Dakota company and may not operate in South Dakota at all. It has become the custom of big incorporations of the east to file their articles in South Dakota's capital because it is cheaper and more latitude is allowed in the purpose of the corporation. All that is obligatory in the organization is that the new company

shall have a resident director of South Dakota named on their board and we have a number of men in this state who make a business of lending their names for this purpose. In this case Ivan W. Goodner is the resident director, but that gives no assurance that the big incorporation is a South Dakota institution. It is not said where the headquarters of the co-operative exchange is or will be, but it is doubtless a creation of the far east. Its purposes are to buy, sell and deal in grain, provisions, live stock and all kinds of produce on commission and otherwise, and for that purpose to build and equip grain elevators, warehouses, cold storage plants, stock yards and whatever may be necessary to carry on the business of the corporation. One-fourth of the capital stock will be used for building the elevators, yards, branch offices, etc., and another fourth will be made a cash fund for the purpose of dealing in cash grain and provisions upon the board of trade. The remaining half of the capital stock will be left virtually with the farmers in various banks where the money has been raised, to enable them to carry their crops for a more favorable market. This will give the farmers \$50,000,000 back of their interests to help them in securing better prices for their produce, so say the incorporators. It is not at all improbable that it is a great scheme to fleece the farmers.

KILLED BY A PREACHER.

Two Brothers Assault a Tennessee Clergyman.

Knoxville, Tenn., Aug. 15.—The news of a double tragedy at Winfield, Scott county, has reached here. Two brothers, John and William Trammell, were killed by the Rev. Whig Duncan, a Baptist minister, whom they assaulted after a quarrel in which John Trammell charged the clergyman with being intimate with his wife. Duncan denied the charge, but the brothers repeated it and then assaulted him with clubs. He managed to get away and warned both men not to continue their assault. They followed him, however, and started to renew the assault, when Duncan drew his revolver and fired, killing both.

War Against Dirty Money.

Cleveland, Aug. 15.—Health Officer Friedrich has begun a war against the use of dirty money in this city, claiming that many cases of smallpox and other contagious diseases can be directly traced to its circulation. Many of the banks have agreed to gather in what they can of the worst appearing of the paper money now in circulation here and replace it with new bills.

LUNCED WITH THE PRESIDENT.

Governor Odell of New York a Visitor at Oyster Bay.

Oyster Bay, Aug. 15.—Governor Odell of New York reached Oyster Bay in a private car attached to the 12:25 train. He was unaccompanied, and, entering the president's trap, which was in waiting, was driven direct to Sagamore Hill, where he lunched with President Roosevelt. Governor Odell declined to state the nature of his visit further than to say that it was purely social; that he had an invitation from the president three weeks ago to lunch with him and that this was the first opportunity he had of accepting it.
