statement was made at the White House during the day:

"The president has expressed to Commander-in-Chief Torrance and to Chairman Warner of the local committee his keen regret at his inability to review the parade of the Grand Army of the Republic on Wednesday. His physicians feel that he should not subject himself to the great strain this would involve. He has, however, thought in some way he might be able to greet the members of the Grand Army in Washington and their families and friends who accompany them. His physicians stated that if nothing unforeseen occurred in his condition and if the weather was favorable he could safely be driven along the line of the parade on Wednesday and it is hoped this ar rangement can be carried out."
