#### ANNUAL CONFERENCE BROOKINGS.

W. S. Hill, of Hanson county, was elected president of the State Farm Bureau federation by a unanimous vote Thursday afternoon, January 27th. The following were elected as members of the board of directors: First congressional district, O. S. Thompson, Minnehaha county, two year term, and John Odland of Turner county, one year; second congressional district, H. K. Dubach, Clark county, two year term, and W. H. Davis, Spink county one year; third congressional district, F. L. Kelso, Fall River county, two year term, and Edgar Watwood, Haakon county, one year.

The augmented program now covers marketing of grain, livestock, wool, seed and potatoes; crop and

livestock statistics; organization work, executive department, legislation, legal investigations, news service and advertising, general office expenses and emergency needs. With the increased financial support voted to the federation, it is expected that the state farm bureau can soon launch a constructive program of work for South Dakota agriculture.—Lake County Farm Bureau.

#### WELFARE NIGHT AT THE FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH SUNDAY.

More than 80 pictures illustrating welfare work at home and in Latin America will be thrown on the screen by the powerful arc light stereopticon that will be used. #### Ancient 45-Story Stone Flat Building Is Found

Baltimore, Md.—The discovery of a stone "apartment" building 45 stories high and containing 1,000 rooms, believed to have been the home of a now extinct tribe of American Indians, was announced at a meeting of the Archaeological Institute of America at Johns Hopkins university. The "apartment" was uncovered with a group of towns representing an ancient civilization in the midst of the southwestern desert. It was unearthed by the School of American Research conducted at Santa Fe, N. M., by the institute. It was described by Edgar L. Hewett, director of the school, at the meeting of the institute held in conjunction with the American Philological association and the Maya society.

#### BUYS WATCHES FOR SUBJECTS

Indian Princess Wants Her People Not to Rely on Sun for Time of Day.

Geneva.—The begum (princess) of Bhopal, India, who bought 4,000 silver watches to take back to her people in the central Indian state when she visited Switzerland in 1911, has just sent for another lot of 2,500 timepieces. She wants her subjects to be punctual and not rely on the sun for the time of day.

The Mohammed princess of Bhopal probably is the only female ruler of a state in India, and is also called sultan. The throne of Bhopal has descended in a female line for more than 75 years and many of the begums have displayed modern tendencies in looking after the welfare of their subjects, who number 685,000. Sultan Jahangir begum succeeded to the throne in 1901.

Bhopal is the principal province of central India and its capital, the city of Bhopal, has about 75,000 population.
