**Sioux Falls Dispatch.** A federal grand jury which convened here Tuesday completed its work and was discharged by Judge Elliott after bringing in several more indictments making a total of 27 returned by the jury since it commenced work. Those indicted were James Leader and Arthur David, both Sioux Indians on the Rosebud reservation, charged with horse stealing; Tom Olson, Madison, altering a \$1 federal reserve bank note so as to represent a \$10 note; Gundersen Holland, Inwood, La., transporting liquor; J. H. McCain and W. F. Ferris, selling liquor.

The Methodist congregation are negotiating for a new parsonage property. After prayer meeting time last Thursday a report of the ways and means committee was adopted and that body retained as a committee of finance to solicit cash and pledges for the immediate purchase of the Hattie McLeod home one full block east of the church. The solicitors were busy yesterday and received a tidy sum with which to make an initial payment. The deal has practically been completed and Mrs. McLeod will give possession on May 1. She has arranged to occupy the cottage located on the former parsonage site. The McLeod home is well built and roomy and the adjoining grounds are spacious. 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#### Will Make New York "Dry"

New York, April 9.—"We are going to make New York 'dry.'

This was the declaration of Police Commissioner Richard H. Straight today, as he took up a task at which the United States government apparently had failed—enforcement of prohibition here.

With the six months dry upon Gov. Nathan L. Miller's signature to the new state prohibition enforcement law, Straight set in motion the machinery to put it into effect. An even dozen arrests for alleged violations was the prompt result.

"The law is there, the police department will enforce it," the commissioner said. "We will proceed exactly as though there were no federal authorities, although we will be glad to aid them and receive their co-operation, of course."

**Marshal Foch and Harding May Attend**

Kansas City, Mo., April 9.—An announcement was made at the Chamber of Commerce here yesterday that Presidents Harding and Marshal Foch of France, may attend the national convention of the American Legion here in October. Word to that effect was received from A. B. Hutchings, chairman of the local committee in charge of arrangements for the convention, who went to Washington to invite the presidents to attend. Mr. Hutchinson telegrammed back that an invitation would be extended to Marshal Foch and that the government would send a ship to bring him to this country if he accepts.

Arthur Green came along and thought he had discovered a stolen auto since the hour was late and no one was in sight. He took possession and landed the auto at the police headquarters waiting identification. On his return to the spot where he left his auto Mr. Gilbran's surprise was complete. The car was gone, but where? It took some argument to persuade Arthur that Mr. Gilbran was the real owner.

At 2 p.m. today there occurred at the Hausefels barn the sale of the international bones case that was driven into Madison several months ago by Barr and Brennan who were convicted of transporting liquor and sentenced to a term in the county jail. A number of buyers were present, the car, a heavy super Hudson, finally going to Dr. W. H. Klemay at \$450. This was a sheriff's sale and the proceeds go by law into the general school fund. #### Killed On His Wedding Journey

HIGHMORE, April 9.—Fatally injured when the car in which he was riding to his wedding overturned, William Cerall, Clare City, near Winona, died at Osage, Minn. In attempting to pass another car on a turn his own machine skidded, and Cerall never regained consciousness after the crash.

Sioux Falls, April 9.—United States grand jury which is in session here this afternoon returned 16 indictments, 7 of which were not made public for the reason that the defendants were not yet in custody. Those indicted are Lee Schobert and Henry Schobert, Lake county, manufacturing liquor; Andrew Blanchard, Union county, having liquor in his possession; Rudolph Morris and Ray Morris, Union county, manufacturing liquor; W. D. Knapp, Sioux Falls, manufacturing liquor; John F. Patrick, Arpin, violation of war tax insurance act; Charles Rosenbaum and Elmer Rosenbaum, Union county, manufacturing liquor.

on Thursday plead guilty to two counts of an indictment charging him with operating a still.

#### Young Farmer Is Found Dead

TOLPA, April 9.—Lester Charlot, age 21, was found dead in the doorway of the barn on his father's farm two miles east of here early this morning. The cause of his death is unknown, although there were slight bruises above his eyes. It is believed death was accidental.

Charlot and another man had been known last evening, on horseback, and had returned home late at night. He had gone to the house for a lantern and had put the horses up, although they were not in their regular stalls.

The unfortunate man was single and a man of good habits.

#### Conditions Favorable In Northern States

#### Marshall Foch and Harding May Attend

HURON, April 9.—The weekly report of M. E. Blystone, meteorologist at the weather bureau here, is as follows:

Damage by the recent cold wave in the central portion of the country is confirmed by reports of April 5 especially to early fruit, but little damage occurred in the more northern and more southern states. High temperatures in northern and western districts were favorable, and farm work generally made good progress except in the Ohio and lower Mississippi valleys where it was hindered by rain. Winter wheat continues to make satisfactory progress excepting that considerable damage is indicated in Missouri and southern Illinois by the recent freeze. Spring wheat seedling progressed favorably although moisture is needed in some central western portions of the belt. The seedling of other spring crops progressed favorably except in some east central districts where it was too wet. Corn made fairly good growth in the southern states. Planting has begun north to Tennessee and southern Missouri. Conditions were mostly favorable for pastures, ranges, and stock but cold weather over much of the Rocky Mountain and Plateau area at the close of the week was unfavorable for young lambs.

#### Gibbons Estate Left To Church

Baltimore, Md., April 9.—The will of Cardinal Gibbons disposes of a personal estate of about \$100,000. To Bishop O. B. Cheatum, administrator of the Baltimore diocese; Rev. L. R. Stickney, rector of the cathedral, and Rev. H. J. Connelly, chancellor of the diocese, is left the bulk of the late pontiff's estate. In a private memorandum he designates the disposition of certain funds for Catholic educational purposes in the archdiocese.

#### Truck Driver Is Blown To Bits

HOMINY, Okla., April 9.—A 16-year-old driver of a nitroglycerin truck for the Geage Thermo company, of Pawhuska, Okla., was instantly killed last night when a hundred pounds of nitroglycerin exploded about five miles west of here. Weed was alone at the time. With the exception of a fragment of a boot, picked up 200 yards from the scene no trace of the body has been found.
