Mashed Potatoes.	Beans.
Min-ne-wa-kan Sku-ya.	Punch.
U-ne-pa-ho-to-na.	Game Salad.
A-Sune-pli-Wa-Sna.	Cheese.

Pe-gu-ta-Sa-pa.	Coffee.
Chan-di-Yu-Kuni-pli.	Cigars.
