Taken Up.

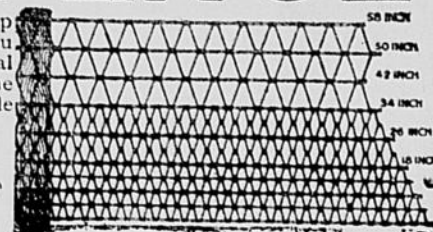
