# CHARGES WILL BE PAID IN KLAMATH

**USERS MAY NOW PAY WATER CHARGES TO RECLAMATION OFFICIAL INSTEAD OF TRANSMITTING THEM TO LAKEVIEW**

Instead of being compelled to transmit water charges to the government through the Lakeview land office, water users in the Klamath project will hereafter pay their charges at the local headquarters of the reclamation service. Chief Clerk C. C. Hogue has just been designated as receiving agent by the government, and will receive from the water users and account direct to the treasury department.

This will save a great deal of time in transmitting the money, and it will also effect a saving of 25 cents on every \$100 transmitted. During the absence of Mr. Hogue Harry Caden will receive the payments.
