MAN IS GUILTY
OF MURDER

YOUNG MAN CAUGHT RECENTLY
IN KLAMATH FALLS BY LO-
CAL OFFICERS QUICKLY FOUND
GUILTY

GRANTS PASS, Sept. 14.—Ralph
Turpin has been found guilty of mur-

der in the second degree for killing
William McCallister at a sawmill near
here on August 10th. Only one bal-
lot was necessary for a verdict.

The testimony showed that Turpin
and his victim had a fight in the mill,
the cause of which no one seems to
know. Turpin left the mill, went to
his bunkhouse, got a pistol and re-
turned, shooting McCallister.

In his own defense Turpin testi-
fied that McCallister had threatened
to beat him up, and when he returned
with the pistol McCallister started for
him with what Turpin considered an
intention of carrying out the threat.
