## Sheep Shearing by Machinery.

According to one of our correspondents, a Mr. Suckling, who owns a sheep station named Borsham, near Murrumbidgee, in New South Wales, has now in operation in his shed a sheep-shearing implement which is driven by compressed air. It resembles a pair of ordinary horse-clippers, and can be comfortably held in the hand. The motive power causes a small piston in the base of the handle of the machine to work backwards and forwards with extreme rapidity. The piston sets in motion a bar, which, working upon a pivot, causes the cutting teeth of the machine to oscillate rapidly over the rigid teeth of the comb below. The cutting action is thus precisely the same as horse-clippers. A rigid metal pipe runs along the length of the shed, and each machine is connected to it by a flexible India-rubber tube. The air is turned on, and the upper teeth of the implement work rapidly over the comb; the operator seizes his sheep and applies his machine. As the teeth of the comb run through the wool close to the skin the cutters sever the fibres quite evenly, and the whole fleece seems to peel off as if by magic. There is no chance of the animal being cut, as with shears. The fleece is much more closely, as well as evenly, taken off than by the old method, and less liable to be broken, and the labor involved is much less. —St. James Gazette.

## TELEGRAPHIC SPLINTS.

The Jersey Lily yesterday left Long Branch for California. She is not in good health.

A four story building in Chattanooga was destroyed by fire on Thursday night, and ten persons lost in the ruins. Loss \$100,000.

At Bloomington's brewery, on Thursday, in Ellensburg, W. T., a small child fell into one of the boiling vats and was scalded to death.

Yellow fever has been declared an epidemic in Jacksonville, Fla., and the people are fleeing. Five new cases have been reported in the past ten hours.

Maxwell, the murderer of Proffer, was hanged in St. Louis yesterday. The rope slipped, and he struggled fearfully for 14 minutes before death came.

Three prisoners broke jail yesterday at Redding, Cal., and are now hotly pursued. One figured in a murder case, one a burglar and the other a horse thief.

## TELEGRAPHIC SUMMARY.

BLAINE HAS ARRIVED.

A Grand Ovation On the Return of the Man from Maine.

NEW YORK, Aug. 10th.—The steamer City of New York was boarded five miles off Sandy Hook, while at anchor waiting for high tide, to cross the bar, by representatives of the press, who learned that the voyage had been a pleasant, uneventful one. Blaine was well, and had not suffered from sickness. He said he was in excellent health, and that his trip had renewed his youth.

Shortly after 8 o'clock the steamer Sloan, with the Blaine committee on board, met the City of New York outside the narrows. The Sloan turned about, and as both slowly steamed up the bay, bow and bow, cheer after cheer rose from the deck of the Sloan, although it was yet impossible to distinguish Blaine from among the 2000 people that stood on the deck of the huge steamer.

As the vessels neared each other Blaine's form was at last made out standing in a group of friends on the upper deck forward. As cheer after cheer arose Blaine bowed repeatedly. He was dressed in a dark cutaway coat, light trousers and brown derby hat.

The band on the Sloan played "Home Again," "Home Sweet Home" and "Star Spangled Banner" while advancing up to quarantine. Then both vessels came to an anchor, and as the Sloan ran over under the side of the city of New York, Blaine's face and form were plainly visible to everyone on board. Cheers again broke forth, handkerchiefs waved, cries of "Blaine," "James G. Blaine" and "No free trade" arose and the utmost enthusiasm prevailed. At last, at 9:15, to the music of "Hail to the Chief," Blaine got on board the Sloan, escorted by Whitelaw Reid.

To a reporter Blaine said he did not know whether he would go on to Maine to-night or not. He did not know what arrangements had been made for him. When told that the Irish Americans proposed to parade him to-night and present an address, he replied: "That's all right; I'm glad of it."

As to what part he would take in the coming campaign Blaine said he could say nothing at present. He did not think he would go outside of Maine until after the State election there on the second Monday in September.

When asked about his health he at first said he was perfectly well, and then added, laughingly: "That's a question I haven't answered in three years."

## A Drug Clerk Suicides.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Aug. 10.—Last evening Ronald G. Birchard, aged 23, a clerk in McDowell & Co's. drug store, committed suicide by swallowing two ounces of muriatic acid during the absence of the proprietors. He afterwards swallowed a quantity of morphine to alleviate his sufferings. It was fully half an hour before the proprietor returned, during which time Birchard waited on several customers, while the acid was slowly eating his vitals. Every effort was vainly made to save his life. He died in great agony. Deceased belonged to Beaverton, Ont., and had worked in Winnipeg, Orillia and Renfrew.

## Prostrated by Heat.

ALBANY, Or., Aug. 10.—A messenger who arrived in this city this evening after medical attendance, said that L. C. Stratton, residing near Miller's station, was sunstruck to-day while working in a harvest field. Whether fatal or not is not learned.

As sunstroke is almost unknown in this climate, it is likely that the victim was indolent, or not in sufficient health to be in the harvest field.
