ALBRECHT STEALS A TEAM

Paroled from Reform School Salem Boy Resumes Evil Ways

Hugo Albrecht, a 17-year-old boy of this city, was arrested last evening by Sheriff Culver and Policeman Busick, on a charge of stealing a team and buggy belonging to Yanke's livery stable.

Young Albrecht was an inmate of the state reform school until a month ago, when he was paroled. He was committed in July, 1905, for forgery.

Young Albrecht, late Monday afternoon rented a single rig of C. W. Yanke, stating that he wished to go to Liberty and return. Upon getting the rig he drove to the south side of the Eades hill back of Dan Frye's place unhitched the horse from the buggy and tied the animal to an oak tree. The young culprit then took the harness and came back to town to sell his plunder, leaving the horse, unblanketed in the cold rain. He visited several second hand stores and finally came to J. L. Freeland's establishment on State street. He told the owner of the store that he was a resident of Liberty and that he had a set of harness which he wished to sell. His reasons for parting with it were that he had sold his small horse and had purchased a larger animal, therefore the harness was useless, then also he needed a little change.

Now Jim is a good hearted fellow. He readily comprehended that a large horse could not be crammed into the space that would exactly be filled by a small coyote. He also saw a man without cash could do nothing and as the goods looked good to him, he ventured to ask the price, and was informed that \$3 would make him the owner of the property. Jim not having the \$3 handy offered \$2.50, which was finally accepted. The two then parted, Mr. Freeland with the harness and the unknown, who gave his name to "Jim" as Rank Ross with the \$2.50.

During the night Mr. Frye heard the nickering of a horse and yesterday the horse and buggy were discovered and identified as the property of C. W. Yanke.

The animal which had stood in the rain all night without anything to eat was cared for and the officers informed of the theft. The harness was located at Freeland's and "Jim" says he does not care so much about the \$2.50, but he would like to hit the fellow just once for lying, while Mr. Yanke is sure that he could teach the thief a lesson for leaving his horse stand out all night.

Mr. Yanke yesterday received a telegram from the owner of the rig and horses in Canby describing the lost property which exactly answers the description of the unclaimed horses and buggy at the feed yard.

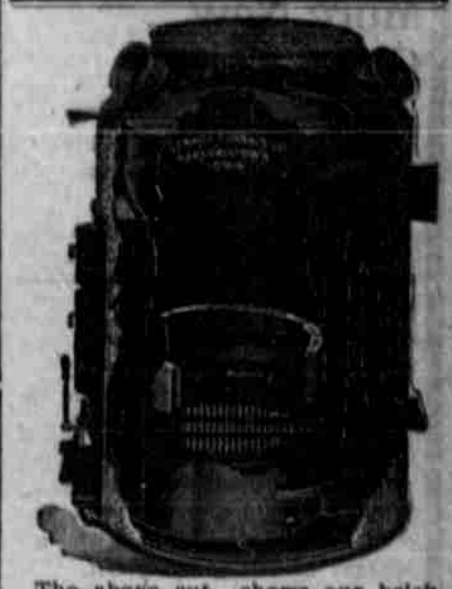
