## FIFTY THOUSAND HUNGRY MEN

### Hughes Will Carry New York, But Taft the Country

#### TAFT FIRST, HUGHES AND ROOSEVELT OUT

Poll of the Republicans in Congress Shows Hughes Fourth and the Third Term Idea Dead

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, Jan. 23.—The Republican members of the house of representatives are in favor of the nomination of Taft for the Republican standard-bearer next summer by a large majority. Hughes is a bad fourth in the list of popular candidates, dropping far below Cannon, and even Fairbanks. As the house is always very close to the people, the expression of sentiment as gathered from this poll may be taken as an excellent guide as to the drift of the Republican feeling in the nation at the present time. The poll was made by the Washington Post,

an independent newspaper, and no names of individual representatives and their preferences are given. This is done to protect the congressmen from embarrassment in opposing the speaker, who is a candidate, or being shown up in the light of opposing the administration's favorite son. The poll developed the fact that all "third-term for Roosevelt" sentiment is dead, not a vote being registered for the President. The ballots ran as follows: Taft 93, Cannon 39, Knox 26, Fairbanks 13, Hughes 8, LaFollette 5, Foraker 1, non-committal 15, absent 20.

#### THAW WENT TO JEROME

TOLD HIS TROUBLES IT IS FULL AND FREE

PROSECUTOR PAID NO ATTENTION BECAUSE HE THOUGHT THAW WAS JEALOUS AND WAS TRYING TO USE HIS OFFICE IN FURTHERANCE OF HIS OWN AFFAIRS.

(United Press Leased Wire.) New York, Jan. 23.—The sensation of the day in the Harry Thaw trial was the startling statement that Harry Thaw once appealed to District Attorney Jerome to have Stanford White brought to the bar of justice, and that the appeal was ignored because the public prosecutor did not think the young Pittsburgher was actuated by high-minded motives.

This new development was brought out in the testimony of Dr. Charles Wagner, a witness for the defense. The latter said he learned of the appeal made by Thaw to Jerome while conversing with the defendant directly.

#### HENDRICKS MAKES CONFESSION

IT IS FULL AND FREE

SAYS HE EXPECTS TO BE FINED, WHICH INDICATES THE CHARACTER OF THE IMMUNITY HANDED HIM BY THE SPECTACULAR HENRY.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Portland, Or., Jan. 23.—Hamilton H. Hendricks confessed on the stand today while under cross-examination in the Hall-Mays land fraud case that while he occupied the office of United States land commissioner he perjured himself and aided in the perjury of others, in order that the Butte Creek Land & Livestock Company might take up certain land claims taken out by the company in his office which were fraudulent, and that he had assisted the company at times in securing possession of these claims. He testified that he expected to be fined by the court for his participation in these corrupt practices.

#### SEVEN HUNDRED COPS 50,000 HUNGRY TRAMPS

In Spite of the Police the Unemployed Are Bound To Parade In Chicago, and to Advocate Socialism

(United Press Leased Wire.) Chicago, Jan. 23.—Braving an attack by 200 policemen who had been instructed to prevent the proposed demonstration, 3000 of Chicago's unemployed, under the leadership of Ben Reitman, self-styled "King of the Tramps," for a short distance marched today from the lake front to the city hall.

The parade had proceeded but a short distance when Reitman, in the midst of thousands who were jammed in the streets along the line of march, blocking all traffic, was taken in custody by the police. The arrest of their leader seemed to give the marchers new life, rather than discourage them, and while Reitman was being led to the city hall his followers marched on.

When the crowd of unemployed gathered on the lake front they were greeted by Reitman. They formed a long line and waited for the "King of Tramps" to give the signal to start.

Chicago, Jan. 23.—With a force of 700 policemen mobilized within the loop district and with the Socialist party determined to march 50,000 unemployed men through the streets in spite of the police order forbidding the parade, much trouble and even bloodshed is anticipated in the event that the Socialists persist in carrying out their program.

Chief of Police Shippey has made preparations to call out the entire police force, if such action is necessary, to prevent the demonstration. Realizing that its plans would be interfered with by the police, the leaders of the Socialist party this morning made an effort to call the march off, but failed. The unemployed

would not listen to any change in the original plans and declared they would show their strength in spite of the police.

When the idle men took this stand Ben Reitman, self-styled "King of the Tramps," issued a general order for the parade.

"We will march, and the police shall not terrorize us," declared Reitman. "I will lead every man who will join me. If the police are determined to shoot us down, let them do it. My mind is made up. I would sooner be dead than live in a country where brutal authority tramples on the rights of citizens. This condition of affairs has gone too far. If the police start to club us there will be hell."

#### Work Killed the Bishop.

Washington, Jan. 23.—How Bishop Rooker, former secretary of the papal legation at Washington, lost his life as the result of depredations of American soldiers on church property in the Philippines was told today by Lieutenant-Colonel Hall to the house committee on insular affairs.

Bishop Rooker was stationed at Jara Island, in Ili Ilo, and, according to Hall, died following privations suffered in an effort to make church property habitable and restore the church to the condition it was before the soldiers wrecked it.

### THEY LAUGHED BEST WHO LAUGHED LAST

Spokane Highwaymen Discover Gold Teeth When Victim Laughed and "Went For Them Then and There"

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Spokane, Wash., Jan. 23.—Hold-up men have created a new record for rapacity in this city. Hitherto coin of the realm, watches and rings, either solid or filled, and gems that would pass the casual inspection and none too rigid examination of the hurried road agent about encompassed the horizon of the highwayman's loot. But since Spokane became a closed town and the money stringency hit the tenderloin with the cruel relentlessness the "stick up" the men have been searching for new

fields for the elusive wherewithal. Last night three holdup men stopped G. E. Hodger, stage manager of the Columbia theater and searched him for valuables. They found but \$2.60. Whereupon Mr. Hodger laughed. In the light of a nearby street lamp the laugh revealed the fact that Hodger's mouth gleamed and glittered from the reflection of three gold-encrusted teeth. Before Hodger was able to make any resistance, he was thrown to the ground and the teeth yanked from his mouth. The teeth were valued at \$25.

#### Cuts Down Telegraph Force.

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Chicago, Jan. 23.—Several railroads entering Chicago have made reductions in their force of railroad telegraphers within the past few days.

The Michigan Central has laid off 55, the Chicago & Northwestern 38, and some other lines have made similar reductions. The men discharged were classed as third track men, and were but recently employed owing to the approach of the time when the new law would become effective governing hours of labor for operators on the railroad lines, which reduced the time to not more than nine hours in 24. It was stated at the

telegraphers' union headquarters that the superintendents of telegraph of the roads held a meeting in Chicago last week, and the reduction was made as soon as the heads of the departments reached their home offices, from which it is inferred that the railroads intend to fight the new law, on the ground that it is unconstitutional.

#### A Receiver Appointed.

Boise, Idaho, Jan. 23.—The Collins Printing Company, publishers of the Boise Sunday Times, established six weeks ago, went into the hands of a receiver today. The publication of the Times will be continued by the receiver, J. H. Hatch.
