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TO REGULATE DRIVING OF AUTOMOBILES IN CITY

TWO ORDINANCES TO PROHIBIT SPEEDING AND PROTECT CITIZENS ON THE STREETS OF SALEM.

There was a race for honors Monday night in introducing bills to regulate motorcars on the streets of Salem. When first reading of ordinance bills was reached the recorder read a very elaborate measure and after concluding reading Mayor Rogers asked for the name of the author. No one spoke, and finally Alderman Hofer from the Seventh ward raised his hand schoolboy fashion and admitted being the guilty party.

The recorder next read another motorcar ordinance and when he had finished Alderman Hofer asked who was the author of that bill. No one responded, but it was admitted by the mayor that the city attorney had drawn up the measure. Both were read twice and referred to the committee on ordinances, composed of Aldermen Moores, Eldridge and Moffett. The ordinances are presented below for reference and comparison:

The bill presented by the mayor is as follows:

A BILL
For an Ordinance amending Section 1 of Ordinance 562 of the Ordinances of the City of Salem, Oregon, and regulating the use of motor vehicles in the City of Salem, Oregon.

Be it Ordained by the Common Council of the City of Salem, Oregon: Section. That section 1 of Ordinance 562 of the Ordinances of the City of Salem, Oregon, entitled "An Ordinance regulating the use of motor vehicles in the City of Salem, Oregon," be and the same is amended to read as follows:

Section 1. That Section 1 of Ordinance 562 of the Ordinances of the City of Salem, Oregon, be and the same is amended to read as follows: "That section 1 of Ordinance 562 of the Ordinances of the City of Salem, Oregon, entitled 'An Ordinance regulating the use of motor vehicles in the City of Salem, Oregon,' be and the same is amended to read as follows:

High street, between the north line of Court street and the south line of Perry street;

Liberty street, between the north line of Court street and the south line of Perry street;

Commercial street, between the north line of Chemeketa street and the south line of Trade street;

Court street, between the east line of Front street and the east line of High street;

Perry street, between the east line of Front street and the east line of Liberty street: Provided, it shall be unlawful to drive upon that portion of said street between said points known as a street intersection at a rate of speed greater than eight miles an hour.

It shall be unlawful for any person driving or operating or in charge of any automobile, motor vehicle or motorcycle, on any street or avenue or portion of street or avenue in said city other than the portions of streets where the speed is above limited, at a rate of speed greater than 15 miles an hour.

It shall be unlawful for any person under the age of sixteen (16) years to drive or operate any automobile, motor vehicle or motorcycle, in the City of Salem, Oregon.

Col. Hofer presented the following:

A BILL
For an Ordinance to regulate the use of automobiles or auto cars or any vehicle propelled by engines for motor power, upon the streets and over the crosswalks of the City of Salem, Oregon, imposing restrictions and penalties for violation of the same.

Be it Ordained by the Common Council of the City of Salem, Oregon: Section 1. It shall be unlawful for person, or persons, firm or corporation, by itself or agent, to drive or cause to be driven, an automobile or auto car on the streets of Salem, Oregon, at a rate of speed faster than 12 miles an hour.

Section 2. Any person or persons, firm or corporation, by itself or agent, who shall be found guilty of violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined in the sum of \$100 to \$500 or by imprisonment for 30 to 60 days.

Section 3. In construing and enforcing the provisions of this ordinance the restrictions, fines and penalties imposed herein shall be deemed to apply to and be collectable against both the driver and owner of the car and the warrant for violation of this ordinance shall in every instance be issued against the driver and owner and they shall be held jointly for such fines and penalties.

Section 4. It shall be unlawful for any driver of an automobile or auto car to drive the same other than on the right side of the street when such street is open and clear of traffic for at least one block ahead of such car.

Section 5. It shall be deemed conclusive evidence of violation of the speed limit prescribed in the ordinance if such automobile or auto car is driven faster on the streets of Salem than an electric car going at schedule speed in the same direction.

Section 6. It shall be unlawful to drive an automobile at a rate of speed greater than 10 miles an hour over the bridge across the Willamette or to pass by any vehicle while driving across said bridge, without the consent of the owner of such vehicle.

Section 7. It shall be unlawful to drive an automobile or auto car at a greater speed than eight miles an hour within the district bounded by Church street on the east, Front street on the west, Trade street on the south, and Center street on the north.

Section 8. It shall be unlawful for any person under the age of 16 years to drive an automobile or auto car on the streets of the City of Salem.

Section 9. Before driving an automobile or auto car or any vehicle within the meaning of this ordinance on the streets of the City of Salem, the owner and driver of the car shall obtain a license as a licensed driver of automobiles or auto cars from the city recorder and pay for the same at the rate of \$1.00 a year.

Section 10. Any person or persons driving an automobile or auto car on the streets of Salem shall be required to sound a siren or other alarm at least three times when approaching any cross street, or turning any street corner within a distance of not more than 100 feet nor less than 50 feet of such crossing.

MOSS BACK OBJECTS TO METHODS

Neither Cook Nor Peary Conduct Themselves in Manner to Suit California Grouch.

Berkeley, Cal., Sept. 7.—Peary's message, in which he stated that he had nailed the Stars and Stripes to the north pole, and Cook's entry into Copenhagen, savor of Buffalo Billism, and press agency," according to quoted statements of Professor Geo. Davidson, an author on Geography and Astronomy.

Professor Davidson declared it to be his belief that both Peary and Cook reached the pole, for the reason that he could not imagine a sane man foolish enough to make such an assertion without proof. He said:

I think that if he had attired himself in the clothes of civilization and shaved himself so as to look like an American citizen, which he could have easily done on board the ship, his return would have been much more dignified, and would not tend to make his native land look ridiculous in the eyes of the world.

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PLUNGED OVER HIGH PRECIPICE

Fred Baker Falls Five Hundred Feet Down Mountain Side But Escapes With Only Bruises.

Aberdeen, Wash., Sept. 7.—Plunging headlong from the rocky side of a mountain in the Olympic range, near Lake Cushman, and with his unconscious body bounding from crag to crag for a distance of fully 500 feet, and yet escaping without a broken bone, is the experience that befell Fred Baker, of this city, who today is recovering from the shock.

In company with several others from the city, Baker climbed the mountain yesterday. The party started to descend when Baker lost his footing and plunged over a precipice before the eyes of his horrified wife. His body rolled down the mountain side until finally it caught in a bunch of shrubs. There he lay until found by one of the party, who fully expected to find him dead. Baker was revived, and after a time was taken to camp. He was frightfully bruised about the body and face. The party reached here in the afternoon and Baker's injuries were attended to by a physician. His body is literally purple from head to foot.
