**West Salem Trains**—  
The Salem and Dallas railroad will operate two trains a day each way during the state fair week, leaving Dallas at 8 a. m. and 5:15 p. m. The run will be made in 55 minutes, including six stops.

**To Install Stamp Mill**—  
L. M. Shoemaker, of the American Mining Syndicate, of Portland, went up to the Santiam mines above Gold Creek today, for the purpose of making arrangements to install a \$6000 crushing plant.

**No Supreme Court Opinion**—  
The Oregon supreme court did not follow the usual custom of handing down opinions today. It will probably be two more weeks before any opinions will be written by the supreme court owing to the vacation time being yet in order.

**New County Judge**—  
Governor Benson today appointed C. H. Gardner county judge of Lincoln county to fill the vacancy caused through the resignation of former County Judge B. F. Swope. The new incumbent is 56 years old and is a retired hardware merchant. He at one time served as county clerk in one of the largest Illinois counties.

**Grip Can't Down Him**—  
Jake Mitchell, the veteran Salem warehouseman and wheat expert, has been ill with the grip for the past week and unable to attend to his work at the Salem Flouring Mills. Jake, in spite of his ripe old age, is yet a hardy Scotchman, and capable of performing a good day's work. Mr. Mitchell has been in the employ of the Salem Flouring Mills for many years, and it is seldom that he misses a working day.

**Bank Brings Suit**—  
The Bank of Heppner has started suit in the circuit court to recover \$4000 from August Walker et al. In the complaint filed this morning by Attorneys C. L. and J. H. McNary and C. E. Woodson, it is alleged that Walker gave the plaintiff his promissory note for \$4000 and at the same time executed a mortgage covering that amount on his property containing 97 1/2 acres situated in Marion county. That the promissory note has not been paid is claimed by the plaintiff and to settle the same the court is asked to render a decree permitting the disposing of the mortgaged property.

**Will Get His Pay**—  
Thaddeus M. Hamilton visited The Journal office Monday just to show us that while Uncle Sam is somewhat slow, he will get around and pay his debts if his creditors will only be patient with him. Mr. Hamilton had just received notice that for his services in Company A, Fiftieth Illinois infantry, the government had neglected to pay him for his time from July 14 to 20, 1865, the sum of \$2.73, and also that there was owing to him on clothing account \$1.21, and that a check would be forwarded for the entire amount, \$4.94. As the debt has run about 44 years it is just the same as if Hamilton had put by 19 cents a year.

**Tramp Took the Bait**—  
A short time ago Marion Kightlinger, a local machinist, accompanied by a companion, twisted up his gasoline engine and buzzed away up the fair Willamette on a little recreation trip. Stowed away in the remote recesses of the little launch, Mr. Kightlinger had a pocket of toothsome eatables, which was to be spread out upon arrival at a suitable camping ground. When the two landed their boat, somewhere up the banks of the upper river, they sauntered about for a while before opening the dinner canteen, and when they returned and prepared to lay the spread, they found that some unknown miscreants had helped themselves to the whole thing and made off with it. It is unnecessary to mention that Mr. Kightlinger and his companion were rather peeved about this, but they did no fruitless grieving, and enjoyed their trip as much as possible without refreshments.
