LIGHTNING HIT HER PARASOL

Butte, Mont., June 7.—Mrs. M. F. Buck, wife of Superintendent Buck, of the Madison River Power Company, was seriously burned and nine other persons were hurt when struck by a bolt of lightning at Ennis yesterday, according to information reaching here today.

Mrs. Buck and a party of friends were watching a baseball game when the lightning struck her parasol. Five men and four women in the immediate vicinity were knocked down and burned. Mrs. Buck's corset was torn from her body and her shoes from her feet. She was burned down one side. It is believed, however, that she will recover. A dog standing at her feet was killed by the bolt.

SALEM IS GROWING RAPIDLY

NEW ADDITION TO BE PLATTED BY PORTLANDERS—TRACT OF 130 ACRES SOLD FOR \$35,000 TO BE MADE PRIVATE PARK—CITY SHOWS BIG GROWTH.

While Portland is going ahead rapidly in the midst of a healthy real estate activity seeker after reasons turns to the country surrounding the metropolis of the Pacific Northwest, and finds there an activity everywhere predominant of which the Portland activity is but the reflex on account of its central location.

All over the territory tributary to Portland the homeseekers from the crowded East are moving in and taking advantage of the rich Oregon lands.

The Willamette valley is one of the most favored of the sections tributary to Portland and on that account the growth there has been even more noticeable than elsewhere throughout the state.

Salem Shows Growth.

One of the valley towns which has taken a remarkable part in the growth of Oregon is the Capital City, Salem, 52 miles south of Portland. Reports show that a real estate activity akin to Portland has taken place there. All over the city the demand for property has suddenly been felt and, following improvement of streets, numerous real estate transactions have been made where until the last year or so property had been practically dormant, and the property owners unable to dispose of their holdings except at prices but little in advance of the prices paid some years ago. Now all this has been changed in Salem, and in concurrence with the new realty movement there the citizens are going ahead with their improvement plans and many fine business buildings are being erected.

It is in the residence portion of the beautiful home city, however, that the growth has been most noticeable. New houses have been springing up on every side, and as a result the older portions of the town have become so crowded that a demand has arisen for room for growth.

To meet this demand Portland capital has stepped in and purchased two farms in West Salem and now a new addition for residence purposes is to be placed on the market there. Charles A. Robertson, a prominent Portland attorney and George P. DeKum, real estate broker, are the purchasers who propose a plan of development and improvement which is large in scope and metropolitan in character. The two properties consist of 130 acres located on the west bank of the Willamette river with over a half mile of river frontage. They are just south of the bridge over the Willamette river and are located with the Salem, Falls City & Western motor line crossing the property. One of the farms is a well-developed 100-acre piece which was bought from Charles A. Ruge for \$25,000, and the other is a tract of 30 acres bought from D. K. Brannan for \$10,000.

Amusement Park Planned.

The new owners of the property intend to develop the part of the property on the river front as a private amusement park, while that on the rear, which is within a mile of the state house, and less than three-quarters of a mile from the center of Salem's retail district, will be platted by a landscape artist and placed on the market as a high-grade residence addition with heavy building restrictions, street improvements put in and in every way handled in the same manner as have been marketed the high-grade residence tracts in Portland.

The park site, which is a beautiful location with great fir trees and a natural park setting, will not be developed until next spring, although the residence tract will be platted and marketed this summer. The property was held under lease by the state militia as the rifle range for target practice, but a relinquishment of this lease has been purchased from the state by the new owners.

The country back of this new addition is developing rapidly. There is probably no part of the state that has come into its own recently as rapidly as has Polk county. This is a rich farming country settled with prosperous farmers and the new addition lies in direct line with the roads of travel from this section to the capital. The West Side of Salem has been developing rapidly recently as a site of manufacturing plants but this is the first available residence tract in that part of the town which has been purchased for plating purposes.

WENT TO DANCE SHOT HERSELF

Renov, Nev., June 7.—Because her grandfather reprimanded her for secretly attending a dance against his wish, 17-year-old Lois Holland, daughter of Charles Holland, proprietor of a hotel at Yerrington, is said to have committed suicide, according to a dispatch published here today. She wrote three letters asking for forgiveness and addressed them to her elder sister, her grandfather and a man friend.

Lois and her sister were visiting their grandfather 17 miles from Yerrington. Sunday they asked permission to attend a dance and the grandfather refused to grant it. The girls retired to their rooms and after the family had gone to bed they slipped out and drove to town. Their grandfather noticed the condition of the horses Monday morning and questioned the girls, who confessed to the trip. A reprimand was given them and later in the day the sound of a shot brought members of the family to Lois' body back of the house.

THIEVES MADE HAUL OF \$5,000

Ashville, N. C., June 7.—Two detectives today were put on the trail of the thief who robbed George Cooke, paymaster of the Hans Rees Sons tannery of \$5000, yesterday afternoon, without Cooke's knowledge. Cooke carried the money in a grip. When he left the bank he was sure that the money was in the case. Opening the receptacle at the office, Cooke found that every cent had been abstracted during his foot journey across town.

Cooke entered two stores while en route from the bank to the office, and it is the theory of the police that some nimble-fingered thief abstracted the bills while Cooke's attention was attracted by something else.
