PRUNE GROWERS FEAR LOSSES AS RESULT OF RAIN

Roseburg, Ore., Sept. 5.—If the rain of the last few days continues the prune growers of Douglas county will lose thousands of dollars. Picking begun last week, and every orchard will have hundreds of bushels rotting upon the ground if the rain does not cease.

Growers expect good prices this fall and a banner crop. Ed. Weaver, a large grower in the Myrtle Creek district, has contracted the best grade of his prunes at 7½ cents, which is considered an unusual price. The sale was made outside of the local pools. Late rains in June not only insured a good crop, but promised that the sizes would run high.

Seventy-five people are working in the new Havens cannery at Greens. Peas are now being canned. Other products handled this season will be tomatoes, apples and prunes.

The entire product is sold to wholesalers.

MAY ACT SOON REGARDING POSTMASTER IN SEATTLE

Washington, Sept. 5.—Action is expected soon in the case of Edgar Battle, who was nominated for postmaster of Seattle early in the life of the new regime. He is a former classmate of Postmaster General Burleson, and is a brother of Richard Achilles Ballinger's law partner. The lawyer Battle was one of the "hand-picked" delegates who wrested control of the Washington state Democratic convention from the Wilson men last summer, and sent a Clark delegation to Baltimore. The nomination of Edgar Battle is ascribed to Hugh Wallace.

President Wilson held up the nomination upon protest from Senator Poinsett. It is still in quarantine, but the senate postoffice committee is about to choose a subcommittee to look into the matter.
